## READING FROM THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES: Isaiah 49: 1-7

Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away! The Lord called me before I was born, while I was in my mother's womb he named me. #### **READING FROM THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES**

#### John 1: 29 - 42

The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God." The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!"

The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

#### **REFLECTION:**

I would like to ask you to think about the moment when you became a Christian or when you realized for the very first time in your life that God loved you or when you realized first time that Jesus is truly the way and the truth and the life in this world and in your life. What was your first reaction after that experience?

I remember the moment when I experienced God and his amazing and unconditional love how much he loves me. It was a dark night. God came to me and showed me and told me how much he loves me even me. I couldn't stop tearing. There was the full of Joy and gratitude in me. I went out and everything in the sky on that night looked like singing and praising God, stars and moon and the trees.... Next day I remember what I did. I went to my friends and I shared this great joy, the experience of God's great love. I couldn't stop sharing this. It was my first reaction after the experience of God's love.

This is precisely what happened to Andrew in our gospel reading. He found the Messiah, he encountered Jesus – and he was so excited he couldn't sit still. Immediately, gratefully, excitedly, he ran to share the good news with his brother Simon. It reads like this in the first chapter of John's Gospel: "(Andrew) first found his brother, Simon and said to him: 'We have found the Messiah'" Then Andrew brought Simon Peter to Jesus. This was the greatness of Andrew. He was the man who was always introducing others to Jesus. Three different times in the Bible, Andrew comes to centre stage... and each time he is bringing someone to meet Jesus.

Here in John 1, he brings his brother Simon Peter. In John 6, Andrew brings to Jesus the boy with the five loaves and two fish. And in John 12, we find Andrew bringing to Jesus the enquiring Greeks who wanted to meet Jesus and visit with Him. Andrew's greatest joy was sharing the good news of Christ and bringing others into the presence of Christ. Having found Jesus, he could not sit still... he had to share Christ with others. He was so grateful, so thrilled, so excited about Christ that he just could not sit still. He could not keep Jesus to himself.

You know, as I think about this... and as I think about my own personal life and spiritual journey, I can tell you that I also have many strong cases of this like Andrew. It goes with being a Christian. Let me show you what I mean by speaking out of my own personal life with two thoughts. I'm sure

that you will think of others out of your own personal and spiritual life, but for now, let me share these two with you.

First of all, because we are Christians, we can be grateful.

Andrew, along with the people of his time, was longing for a Messiah to come, hoping for a Messiah, praying for a Messiah. When he found the Messiah in Jesus, he was incredibly grateful. You know there is no such thing as an ungrateful Christian. Christianity by definition is our grateful response to God for his love of the world and his gift to the world of Jesus Christ. Responsive gratitude. That's what Christianity is all about. I still remember when I was a high school kid in Korea that I was in the youth conference and the pastor asked all the kids to make a list of what they can be thankful to God for what God has given to them, some wonders of my life. I was having trouble with my list. Half an hour passed and I still didn't know what to write. I closed my eyes and prayed and prayed. "God, please help me.." After few minutes of silence, I started writing something in my list.

- 1. to be able to see
- 2. to be able to hear
- 3. to be able to touch
- 4. to be able to feel
- 5. to be able to taste
- 6. to be able to laugh
- 7. to be able to breathe
- 8. to be able to love."

Isn't it amazing how we overlook and take for granted the gifts that God has given us? We become so captivated by man-made things that we sometimes forget the amazing generosity of God. Read the Psalms. They resound on page after page with praise and gratitude to God. Psalm 100 is a classic example:

"Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the lands. Serve the Lord with gladness! Come into his presence with singing! Know that the Lord is God! It is he that made us and we are his. We are his people and the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him and bless his name. For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures forever and his faithfulness to all generations."

A missionary in Africa was preaching his first sermon in a mission church. When time came for the offering, the people danced their offerings forward. They danced and sang praise to God as they brought their offerings to the altar. It was a beautiful moment. What do you think? Should we get our ushers to do that? After the service, he asked one of the people, "Why do you dance and sing when you bring your offering forward on Sunday morning?" Back came the answer: "How could we not dance?

We are so grateful to God for what He has done for us in sending Jesus Christ to save us... that we have to dance and sing our thanksgiving... and besides it says in the Bible, God loves a cheerful giver." Let me ask you something. Do you feel gratitude to God? When you are Christians, gratitude is the spirit of your lifestyle. When you are a Christian, you can be grateful!

Secondly, because we are Christians, we can be loving.

Again, Andrew is a great example of love. He was big-hearted, generous. He was a loving, caring person who was eager to share and anxious to help others. If only we could learn that lesson from Andrew, life would be better for all of us.

Let me introduce the story of Rev. Son Yang-Won who proclaimed the gospel to the soldier ready to shoot him as well as forgave the murderer of his two oldest sons. He is remembered as a martyr of love who embraced the burden of colonial oppression and war that impaired Korea's modern history.

He converted to Christianity at the age of seven, and, beginning in 1926, ministered in Gyeongnam Province, Busan, Gwangju, Yeosu, and other regions. In 1939, he began his ministry at Aeyangwon, a center for leprosy patients. Because he refused the Shinto Worship forced by Japan, he was put into prison and tortured. After Korea was liberated from the Japanese colonial rule in 1945, Rev. Son returned to the leper house and began to care for patients. He loved lepers so much even to draw the pus from a patient's boil with his own mouth.

In 1948, moreover, Rev. Son's two sons were murdered by a violent communist. When the conflict between atheistic communism and Christian faith resulted in the murder of his sons, he may have immediately felt resentful in front of their dead bodies. For him it was a horrible event comparable to the collapse of the sky or the sinking of the ground, but transformed his anger into such a great love of his enemy in Jesus Christ that he decided to adopt the murderer of his sons. In this way he overcame and dismissed the ideological conflict. In September 1950 he was shot to death while proclaiming the gospel to the soldier who was attempting to shoot him. His age was 48. In memory of his great life Korean Christians speaks highly of him as "a little Jesus in Korea."

Now, where did Rev Son Yang-Won learn to love like that, to reach out to people in need like that, to make a difference in people's lives like that? You know, don't you? From Jesus. The same place the disciple Andrew learned it, from Jesus. He was the man who was always introducing others to Jesus and sharing what he learned from Jesus with others. Having found Jesus, he could not sit still... he had to share Christ with others. He was so grateful, so thrilled, so excited about Christ that he just could not sit still. He could not keep Jesus to himself.

Where are you now? What have you learned from Jesus? Are you sharing with others what you have learned and experienced? Are you sharing with others God's amazing love that his only son Jesus came and died on the cross for us? Are you so grateful, so thrilled, so excited about Christ that you cannot sit still? You see, when you are a Christian, you get a strong experience like this. You can be grateful, you can be so excited about Christ, you can be loving. Amen.
