# From the Heart

Explorer of our hearts, discerner of our souls, we invite you into the depths of our struggles. We open the locked doors. With words of love and boldness of truth, we ask you to knock on the hardest places of our hearts and soften them so we may love you and love our neighbours. Amen.

Seven weeks into the new year and our resolutions might now feel more like routines than resolutions. We can be lulled back into living by habits and behaviours and might stop questioning what is at the heart of the matter.

This week, Jesus' teachings in the Sermon on Mount help us take another look at some commandments to discover what is at the heart of the law. As the people of Israel look toward a land of promise, the author is clear – following in God's way leads to life.

**Deuteronomy 30:15–20** makes plain our choice as citizens of a global world, children of an interconnected creation: "I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity." The advice of Deuteronomy 30 is about more than by which to live; it's about right relationships. Faithfulness to God and God's ways are life-giving. Sirach 15:15–20 echoes the themes of faithfulness and our freedom of choice.

Happiness lies in keeping God's commandments, as the psalmist prays in **Psalm 119:1–8** and thus asks for an "upright heart." The Israelites considered the heart the centre of thought and intention. Psalm 119 is written as an acrostic using the Hebrew alphabet in a repetitive form to aid in memorization. Saying this psalm is a way of inscribing the heart with thoughts and intentions to love God and God's commandments.

The Corinthian church seems to have been full of conflict. In **1 Corinthians 3:1–9,** Paul cautions against jealousy and rivalry within the Christian community. Those who are jealous of one another are not living according to God's way. Instead, they act in immature ways. Paul uses the metaphor of the garden to show that God gives life and growth when we work together.

**Matthew 5:21–37** Torah, the first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures, contains many regulations and commandments about specific details of everyday life. Jesus' followers sought to discover what it meant to apply these teachings in new situations. Applying a traditional rabbinic method: "You have heard it said...but I say..." Jesus addresses the difficult topics of daily life and deepens their meaning for an ethical life. As he discusses anger (vv. 21–26), adultery (vv. 27–30), divorce (vv. 31–32), and true speech (vv. 33–37), Jesus tells his audience not just how to act but how to be – be in the image of God.

On first hearing, the rules Jesus sets out seem like stricter replacements for the commandments given in Deuteronomy. At a closer look, they deconstruct actions of murder, retribution, betrayal, abandonment, and lying into symptoms of our hard-heartedness and refusal to be reconciled to each other. In holding up the vision of each person with hearts reconciled to God and one another, Jesus claims personhood for all parties involved. The judged and the judger are not bound in the past but together liable for the justice and reconciliation of the future. Condemnation of adultery – thought as well as deed – challenges our tendency to treat others as objects rather than as subjects. This idea, along with coming down on the accepted practice of men divorcing their wives, furthers Jesus' campaign for the equal personhood of women.

The lesson on oath-taking seeks not merely to rid an antiquated practice but to open our eyes to the insidiousness of selfinterest. We are either too concerned with being liked or accepted or so unconcerned with the hearer of our words and the receiver of our pledges and vows that we do not take care in speaking words that are true or in making sure they stay true. Life is full of opportunities, especially for those living in an industrialized and technological society. Still, options aren't the same as the choices we make that change the course of our lives.

Jesus shows us a new way of being human, of being peacemakers, of reconciling conflict, of telling the truth. As Christians, how should we handle conflict and rivalries within the Body of Christ? What does it mean to hold fast to God from the heart? What does it mean to live in ways that restore relationships and strengthen community?

#### Sirach

[The Book of Sirach] or Ecclesiasticus (abbreviated Ecclus.) – not to be confused with Ecclesiastes, is a Jewish work, originally in Hebrew, of ethical teachings, from approximately 200 to 175 BCE, written by the Judahite scribe Ben Sira of Jerusalem, on the inspiration of his father Joshua son of Sirach, sometimes called Jesus son of Sirach or Yeshua ben Eliezer ben Sira.

In Egypt, it was translated into Greek by the author's unnamed grandson, who added a prologue. This prologue is generally considered the earliest witness to a canon of the books of the prophets, and thus the date of the text is the subject of intense scrutiny. The book itself is the largest wisdom book from antiquity to have survived. (Wikipedia)] The book is found among the books of the Apocrypha.

Sirach 15:15-20 (The reading for today)
If you choose, you can keep the commandments, and to act faithfully is a matter of your own choice.
He has placed before you fire and water; stretch out your hand for whichever you choose.
Before each person are life and death, and whichever one chooses will be given.
For great is the wisdom of the Lord; he is mighty in power and sees everything; his eyes are on those who fear him, and he knows every human action.
He has not commanded anyone to be wicked, and he has not given anyone permission to sin.
