

Sacred Encounters

O Sacred Love, you encounter us in places where we seek you and in places where we flee from you. Ease our fears. Open our ears and eyes to you, wherever and in whomever you reveal yourself to us. Prepare us to journey as you call. Amen.

The Season after the Epiphany closes on a holy mountain where God may be found. It is a place of sacred mystery, where shining and shadow convey holy presence. It is a place of community across time, where God's people past and present meet. It is a place of silence and witness, where visions are kept quiet, and God says of Jesus, "Listen to him."

Exodus 24:12–18 A cloud and mountain mark a new accessibility of God, as well as a time of secrecy and anticipation. Moses ascends Mount Sinai, and Joshua accompanies him partway. A cloud covers the peak for six days, and on the seventh day Moses is invited to enter the cloud. God's glory meets Moses in shadow and light.

The words of **Psalm 99** balance God's holiness with an affirmation of God's justice. The "holy mountain" of the temple on Mount Zion continues to offer a place of resting in God's presence.

The messianic poem of **Psalm 2** distinguishes between the kings that disregard God and the one whom God sends to change the world. God's coronation words: "You are my son; today I have begotten you" mark the authentic claim of this messianic ruler. These words are echoed throughout Matthew's account of the life of Jesus and in the author's account of the Transfiguration in **2 Peter 1:16–21.** Second Peter is presented as the final testimony of Peter and recalls his witness of this

moment in the life of Jesus as a pivotal point in his life and to the lives of those who will attend to its prophetic nature.

Matthew 17:1–9 The word transfigured in verse 2 translates the Greek verb *metamorphoo*. Elsewhere in the New Testament, that verb suggests changes deep within a person. The story of Jesus' transfiguration uses outward details to hint at the deeper mystery of metamorphosis. The report of how three of Jesus' friends react to it reveals the tension between the desire humans have for illuminated truth and empirically demonstrative truth. Peter tries to contain the surprise and delight he feels at the shining Jesus before him by building three dwellings for the apparitions that are loosening his tight grasp of truth.

In the Season after the Epiphany, we celebrate revelations big and small. We call out the need to be present in the moment to catch them, and we track how memory, contemplation, and reflection on them change us. Epiphany culminates in the dazzling vision of Jesus on a mountaintop in which heaven and Earth, history and future, all come together with sun, cloud, past prophets, and a voice from above to reveal the unique and beloved nature of Jesus as God's son.

Epiphany began with the revelation of the promise of the change a child's life will bring to the magi and ends with the secret of the freedom that Christ's death and resurrection will bring. Throughout, we are reminded of how extraordinary the ordinary can be. In this season and at all times, we must live in the potential of the mundane to become sacred through revelation and reflection and in the challenge to make perfect love more real through action and devotion. To do this, we are called to be present and open ourselves to the numinous experience at any time and in any place.


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Epiphany began with light as the magi followed a star to find Jesus. Indeed, the whole season is about revealing the light – a light of God's love made manifest as Jesus is revealed in new ways. In the story of Jesus' transfiguration, the light is brighter than ever before, but it doesn't last long; the moment passes all too quickly. When have you felt like that, reaching a moment of revelation or sacred encounter, only to have the moment pass and you have to move on? As we enter the Season of Lent, when the light of Epiphany diminishes, what echo of God's glory and God's mystery do you carry with you?
