To See Is to Love

Holy God, lift our gaze and open our hearts, that we might see your love all around. May your abiding presence encourage us to love more. Amen.

Urban Dictionary defines the phrase "I see you" as "what someone says to you when they understand where you are coming from or are impressed with you." We are reminded that the indwelling love of God and the Spirit's enduring presence is with us. We are never alone and never abandoned.

Acts 17:22–31 Paul addresses the Athenians with striking graciousness and thoughtfulness. No stern words about pagans or heathen idols. Only respect for the Athenians' skills and their statues. Paul looks beyond the externals to the essentials. He meets the Athenians where they are and asserts why there is no need for statues to unknown gods. "We are God's offspring," made in God's image, who knows us and loves us.

The author of **Psalm 66:8–10** reminds us that God's love remains constant whatever we go through. The psalmist is overwhelmed by the need to tell others about God's action and presence. God's love overflows.

1 Peter 3:13–22 reassures us that we do not need to be afraid, whatever the journey of faith entails. Whatever we go through, we are not abandoned; we are not alone. The perfect indwelling love of God casts out fear. The reference to the historic flood and God's redemption of sin echoes the psalmist's journey through water and fire.

John 14:15–21 continues Jesus' farewell speech to his disciples from the upper room at the Last Supper. There is a tenderness, as we can imagine he meets each disciple's gaze and offers a

summary of his ministry and instructions for theirs and ours. He explains the indwelling of God by introducing the concept of God's Spirit. It is the first of four teachings in the gospel of John. The Spirit is described as "advocate" from the Greek *parakletos*. "Paraclete" has a range of meanings that communicate who the Spirit is by what the Spirit does. Among other things, Paraclete can mean to encourage, help, or comfort. The use of "advocate" here comes from the way the word is used in other settings to convey the equivalent of a defence attorney. The Spirit comes as a gift from God, just as John earlier portrayed Jesus as God's gift (3:16).

The emphasis in this passage is not so much belief in Jesus as it is love for Jesus. The importance of the Paraclete as "advocate" is one who supports and helps us as we seek to love. Such love is revealed in this passage through action. All five occurrences of *love* in this passage are verbs. Each exercise of love is connected with keeping Jesus' commandments. Jesus had announced a new commandment in John 13:34: "love one another."

As much as our faith may lead us to feel abandoned when our insistence on love and justice puts us at odds with the world – even with those closest to us – we have the assurance that we will be accompanied. Without faith, Jesus is not seen or heard.

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What is it that we worship, and what keeps us from the love that Jesus preached? Where do we need to be reminded of the abiding presence of the Spirit and reassured that in choosing to love, we will find the spaciousness and comfort of God?

Special Days Commentary

May 14 - St. Matthias


Not one of the original 12 apostles, Matthias, was chosen by the other disciples after Jesus had ascended into heaven. Matthias replaced Judas Iscariot, who had betrayed Jesus and later killed himself. Acts 1:15–16 records how the disciples chose Matthias by casting lots.



May 18 - Ascension Day

The feast of the Ascension is observed on the 40th day after Easter, always falling on Thursday.

The story of Jesus ascending to heaven is mentioned briefly in Luke 24:50–51 and more completely in Acts 1:6– 11. Some scholars believe that the earliest commemorations of the Ascension were tied to the celebration of Easter or Pentecost. Today, the Ascension is not a major celebration in many Protestant churches, though some churches hold special Ascension Day services. Ascension Day is a legal holiday in parts of Europe, and businesses are closed.
