BIBLE READINGS

Exodus 33:12-23

Moses said to the Lord, "See, you have said to me, 'Bring up this people,' but you have not let me know whom you will send with me. Yet you have said, 'I know you by name, and you have also found favour in my sight.' Now if I have found favour in your sight, please show me your ways, so that I may know you and find favour in your sight. Consider, too, that this nation is your people." He said, "My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest." And he said to him, "If your presence will not go, do not bring us up from here. For how shall it be known that I have found favour in your sight, I and your people, unless you go with us? In this way, we shall be distinct, I and your people, from every people on the face of the earth." The Lord said to Moses, "I will also do this thing that you have asked, for you have found favour in my sight, and I know you by name." Moses said, "Please show me your glory." And he said, "I will make all my goodness pass before you and will proclaim before you the name, 'The Lord,' and I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy. But," he said, "you cannot see my

face, for no one shall see me and live." And the Lord continued, "See, there is a place by me where you shall stand on the rock, and while my glory passes by I will put you in a cleft of the rock, and I will cover you with my hand until I have passed by; then I will take away my hand, and you shall see my back, but my face shall not be seen."

Matthew 22:15-22

Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said. So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, "Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one, for you do not regard people with partiality. Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, "Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? Show me the coin used for the tax." And they brought him a denarius. Then he said to them, "Whose head is this and whose title?" They answered, "Caesar's." Then he said to them, "Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." When they heard this, they were amazed, and they left him and went away.

REFLECTION

A Little Boy desperately wanted \$100 to buy some toys and prayed to God for a whole week, but nothing happened. So he decided to write a letter to God requesting the \$100. When the Post Office got the letter addressed to God they forwarded it on to the Parliament house in Canberra. The Prime Minister surprisingly received it and was very impressed, touched and amused so he instructed his aid to send the boy \$5. He thought \$5 would be a lot to the little boy. And the boy was, indeed, delighted by the money. He sat down and immediately wrote a thank you note, which read: Dear God, thank you very much for sending the money. However, I noticed that for some reason you had to send it through Canberra and as usual they kept most of it.

Our gospel text today is about paying taxes. Jesus was challenged with an interesting dilemma. The Pharisees and the Herodians tried to catch Jesus in a word of disloyalty against either the Roman Empire, or the Jewish people. They hoped that he would take one of two sides therefore placing himself on the bad side of someone. The question was "Is it right to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" They thought that there were only two possible answers. Yes, it is right to pay taxes or No it is not right. Either answer would condemn Jesus. If Jesus said it was right to pay taxes, he would be accused of being a traitor to the Jews and of being in favour of the Roman Occupation. This would alienate him from all his supporters. If Jesus were to say it was wrong to pay taxes, then he would prove he was against Rome. The Jewish leaders would be able to say Jesus had shown himself to be a revolutionary and he could be handed over for trial and execution. All he had to do was say that paying

taxes was either good, or bad. They were looking for a simple answer to a difficult question. Instead, Jesus showed them the face on the coin and let them answer their own question. What a way to provide an answer.

Often, we have our own difficult questions. We look to God for answers, and sometimes we don't hear what we are expecting. Sometimes, we are not ready for the answer. Other times, we might receive the answer, but we don't like the result. But, the most destructive questions are those that really don't have an answer. This morning, I would like to look at how we question God and how we relate to the answers we receive.

First of all, sometimes, we are not yet ready to bear the answer. Children are great examples of people not ready to know all the answers. They are often the most interested in learning more, and they ask some of the toughest questions too. Toddlers are known to ask why, why, why to the point that others around them finally give up and answer, "Just because."

Why is the sky blue. Because the sky reflects light from the oceans.

Why is it blue though. I don't know, maybe the water is blue.

But some water is green, why isn't the sky green.

I guess there's more blue water than green.

But I never see a green sky, why isn't the sky green some times.

Why is it always blue? I don't know. Just because.

There is no way we can have all the answers or understand all the issues that impact even the simple questions. I don't know why the sky is blue instead of green. In the end, it really doesn't satisfy their inquisitive minds. They want to know more, and as they find out more, they want to know more than that. They question everything around them and challenge almost every assumption. This is a good thing for young minds, but they are not ready to know everything. Just like children are not always ready to hear the answers to some of the simplest questions, we too are children in God's eyes. We are not necessarily ready for all of the answers to all of our questions. Sometimes, we need to trust that God will provide the answers when the time is right.

Secondly, sometimes our questions have no desirable answers. There are some questions that have no real answers. It may look like a question, it may even sound like a question, but sometimes it is really a pointed statement or an attempt to throw someone off balance. Sometimes people want to argue or test God. That is what we see in the Gospel message today. Jesus was given a question that was expected to have no answer. He was expected to be wrong regardless of how he answered. Like the Pharisees and the Herodians, we often pose questions to God that we feel can't have a right answer either. Why did this bad thing happen? Why am I in this bad situation today? Why me Lord? We are probably all wondered

something similar at sometime or another. Sometimes these are appropriate questions. But sometimes, we already know the answer to our question and God can't answer in a way that will ever satisfy us. That's an attitude problem that we need to deal with. It is not an issue of the answer, but the nature of the question. If we really want to have the answer, we will be happy with the result, even if it is opposing to our preconceived notions. Attitude can be changed simply by humbly coming to God, ready to receive what he offers, even if it is not the answer we expected.

The story is told of an old man who lived on a farm in the mountains with his young grandson. Each morning, Grandpa was up early sitting at the kitchen table reading from his old Bible. His grandson who wanted to be just like him tried to imitate him in any way he could. One day the grandson asked, "Grandpa, I try to read the Bible just like you but I don't understand it, and what I do understand I forget as soon as I close the book. What good does reading the Bible do?" The Grandfather quietly turned from putting coal in the stove and said, "Take this coal basket down to the river and bring back a basket of water." The boy did as he was told, even though all the water leaked out before he could get back to the house. The grandfather laughed and said, "You will have to move a little faster next time," and sent him back to the river with the basket to try again. This time the boy ran faster, but again the basket was empty before he returned home. Out of breath, he told his grandfather that it was impossible to carry water in a basket, and he went to get a bucket instead. The old man said, "I don't want a bucket of water; I want a basket of water. You can do this. You are just not trying hard enough," and he went out the door to watch the boy try again. At this point, the boy knew it was impossible, but he wanted to show his grandfather that even if he ran as fast as he could, the water would leak out before he got far at all. The boy scooped the water and ran hard, but when he reached his grandfather, the basket was again empty. Out of breath, he said, "See Grandpa, it is useless!" "So you think it is useless?" The old man said, "Look at the basket." The boy looked at the basket, and for the first time he realized that the basket looked different. Instead of a dirty old coal basket, it was clean. "Son, that's what happens when you read the Bible. You might not understand or remember everything, but when you read it, it will change you from the inside out." That is the work of God in our lives. To change us from the inside out and to slowly transform us into the image of his son.

Reading the Bible is a way we can change our attitude. We can improve from the inside out through prayer, worship, confession, communion and even singing. In this way, we are slowly turning another part of our time and ourselves over to Him. The works we perform on the outside have an effect on the inside as well. It may happen slowly, so slowly that we don't even notice it. But, like the coal basket, we become clean on the outside as God cleans us on the inside.

Brothers and sisters in Christ. What can we learn from the Pharisees and Herodians questions? In God's eyes, we are the inquisitive children. Sometimes the questions are simple. Sometimes they are complex. Sometimes we like the answers, and sometimes we avoid what we don't want to hear. Sometimes we are ready to hear the truth and move on with the knowledge. Other times we are like children, unable to understand or bear the reality that exists. It is probably one of the hardest things we can do, once in a while, we may need to drop how we think situations should be resolved, and let God figure it out for us. Ultimately, our attitude towards our relationship with God determines how we ask questions. Just like our relationships with family and friends are dictated by our relationships with them, the same is true with God. Come closer to God. He is waiting for you. Ask the answerable questions and he will provide the answers. But, be patient, the answers come in his time with his wisdom. Amen.
