



### **Learning Leaders**

Community-creating God, may we slow down enough to allow our actions to proclaim your teaching in our words and deeds. Amen.

This week's scripture readings highlight leadership as a critical factor in the life of communities of faith. Leadership matters. Leadership is service. Leadership cultivates a loving community of equals. Disciples — learners and leaders together — grow as they love God and neighbour.

Joshua 3:7–17 Following the death of Moses, the story of the people of Israel continues under the leadership of Joshua. Joshua's leadership becomes significant. For everyone to cross the water into a new land and life safely requires shared responsibility. There are some challenging questions concerning the inhabitants of the land. However, we have strong depictions of the presence of God with the people and of effective leadership.

**Psalm 107:1–7, 33–37** offers praise for the constant loving presence of God, even when the people turn away and forget the trust that resonates through this psalm.

**Matthew 23:1–12** begins the final major section of Matthew (23:1–25:46), which has the overarching theme of the present and coming judgment of God. It is addressed to Jesus' disciples and potential disciples rather than to Jesus' opponents. The scribes and Pharisees represent the Jewish leadership in the time of Matthew's community and not necessarily in Jesus' time. It indicates the growing tension between synagogue and church in the latter part of the first century.

Particular critical attention is directed to those who "sit on Moses' seat." M. Eugene Boring reminds us that "'Moses' seat' is a metaphorical expression representing the teaching and administrative authority of the synagogue leadership, scribes, and Pharisees." They are not criticized because they know the Torah and its importance in their lives but because

of their behaviours (*The New Interpreter's Bible: A Commentary in Twelve Volumes,* vol. VIII, p. 431).

The function of the priests ceased after the destruction of the Jerusalem temple. Still, Matthew suggests that demands placed on the people to live out their vocation as a priestly nation became focused in the wrong direction. Instead of being a blessing, the requirements of traditions and rituals became too hard for ordinary people to fulfill. Jesus' expectations turned people to the life-giving and liberating direction initially intended.

The final criticism concerns the motivation for actions rather than the actions themselves — the desire to do something to create a good impression, not because it is the right thing to do. For Jewish people living in a pluralist society, it became important to be recognizable, distinctive, and unique for survival as a faith community. The increasing tendency to favour those identifiable leaders risked overlooking the "little ones." This was particularly challenging for the emerging, egalitarian Matthean community.

After these criticisms, the attention turns to Jesus' followers in the Matthean community. Take heed that you do not adopt those practices and deceptions, which undermine the community of equals.

The Matthean community are leaders in the Christian community. They are servant leaders. They do not look for accolades, titles, public recognition, social advancement, or promotions. Family heritage is not relevant. In the Christian community, all are children of God and siblings of Jesus the Christ. Leadership is known in serving the community, in the way Christ leads.

**1 Thessalonians 2:9–13** offers a character reference of those who have shared the gospel with this community. This is not baseless boasting. The response of the Thessalonians confirms that their words and actions witness to God's work in and through them.

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This week's readings remind us of the countercultural nature of Christian leadership. To be a Christian leader is to attempt to be Christ-like in how we live. It is to be faithful to God alone. It is to live with integrity the way we proclaim when we teach. Who are the leaders we thank for their authenticity in living what they teach?

### November 1 – All Saints Day November 2 – All Souls Day

In many churches, All Saints Day (November 1) celebrates all people of faith, recalling how, in New Testament usage, the word *saints* refers to Christians collectively, as well as those people of special significance who have been set apart by the church or canonized. It is the recognition of the common bond of Christians, both living and dead, and the common bond of the church here on earth and the church triumphant in heaven. If November 1 falls on a weekday, All Saints Day is generally observed on the following Sunday.

For those traditions who use All Saints Day to commemorate canonized saints or those whose lives have been particularly Christlike, All Souls Day on November 2 provides an opportunity to remember other Christians who have died

The night before All Saints Day was originally known as All Hallows Eve and, over time, became shortened to Halloween. Tracing its roots to an ancient Celtic day of the dead known as Samhain, it was believed that souls and supernatural beings would wander the night. Various traditions have merged over time, ranging from praying for saints and "lost souls" to children dressing up in costumes and going from door to door in search of treats.

All Saints Day is a time to remember the saints who have gone before us and to give thanks for the blessings God has given us to

share with others. When we faithfully place ourselves in God's presence, new possibilities for life and service become visible. We have a role to play, along with the saints of old, in the story of God's saving work. What might we do, as individuals and as the church, to welcome all people to live in God's promise?
