

Word for the Day

The horrific reality of the cross is sometimes forgotten by those among us who live in relative comfort and prosperity. While many symbols seek to represent the meaning of God's action in Christ Jesus, the symbol of the cross is most prominent. The gospel writer suggests that Jesus of Nazareth proclaimed God's reign, taught about loving God and neighbour, and healed, always knowing that this agenda would bring him into conflict with powerful people who would prefer things to remain the same (that is, for them to remain powerful). This conflict would lead to his death.

Being a disciple of Jesus is not something that can take place in observation or from the outside. The way of Jesus is participatory. He calls those who would be his followers, his disciples, to live as he lives, to join him on the road. The words given to Jesus in this passage suggest that those who follow in his way, by loving God and neighbour, will also come into conflict with powerful people who would prefer the status quo to a world where all creation can flourish. How will Jesus' hearers respond? How will the hearers measure loss and gain, life and death? Furthermore, how do we? Ideas for Reflection

- Do you find the cross a helpful symbol for life as a follower of Jesus? Why/why not? Are there other symbols you find meaningful as you follow Jesus?
- Imagine you are Peter in this story. How might Peter be experiencing this? (It might help to recall that Peter named Jesus as the Christ immediately before the passage we read here.)
- What examples come to mind of others who have lived seeking justice and enacting love in ways that mirror the life of Jesus? These examples might include the well-known but also the thoroughly unknown and ordinary.

Theme Focus

Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: 'The Human One must suffer many things...' ~ Mark 8:31a.

This week, we acknowledge that following the Way of Christ can be difficult. Jesus was under no illusion of the suffering and rejection he would experience as he called for God's reign of justice to be present on earth.
