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OPENING PRAYER

So we praise you, our God, who does not trade love for love but gives love without price, who does not return evil for evil but renders good for evil, who does not crucify sinners but dies in their place.

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The Service of the Word

BIBLE READINGS

Genesis 17:1-7;15-16

1 When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to Abram and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. 2 And I will make my covenant between me and you and will make you exceedingly numerous." 3 Then Abram fell on his face, and God said to him, 4 "As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. 5 No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham, for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. 6 I will make you exceedingly fruitful, and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. 7 I will establish my covenant between me and you and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you.

15 God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. 16 I will bless her and also give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

Mark 8:31-38

31 Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes and be killed and after three days rise again. 32 He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. 33 But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." 34 He called the crowd with his disciples and said to them, "If any wish to come after me, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. 35 For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. 36 For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? 37 Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? 38 Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

REFLECTION

Well, here we are on the second Sunday of Lent. It is the time of year when we are called to reflect, repent and renew. I encourage you to continually remember Jesus' journey to Calvary to the cross and I hope you be a true disciple of Christ and experience God's amazing love as you journey together with Christ in this Lenten season.

Have you ever said something really dumb? Or said something that came out all wrong? I remember one Sunday morning in my previous placement that I made everybody laugh when I said the opening words to my prayer. As we got ready for the morning pray, what I meant to say was, "Let us bow our heads in and pray silently while the organ plays." But what I actually said was, I said, "Let us bow our heads in a moment of prayer, while the organ plays silently...." The organist sat there with her fingers frozen in midair over the keyboard and a puzzled look on her face which clearly said, "How do I play silently." This is what Peter did in our Gospel story this morning.

"Who do people say that I am?" Jesus asked his disciples one day. The disciples answered that some people thought he was John the Baptizer or Elijah or one of the prophets. "Enough of what other people think," Jesus said. "What about you? Who do you say that I am?" This time Peter answered. "You are the Christ". Christ was the Greek word for Messiah. Peter thought that Jesus was the promised Messiah. Jesus praised Simon, "You are so great..." After that Jesus told the disciples that he was going to have to suffer and be put to death. Peter couldn't stand that idea and told him, "This shall never happen to you". Jesus recognized the same temptation coming to him as he had heard in the wilderness. The temptation to not complete his mission. He told Peter, "Go away from me Satan, you don't care about the things of God, you are only seeing things in human terms." At this point Jesus spoke to the large crowd and also to the individual. They all had the same opportunity to hear and to respond. He said to all of them--his closest disciples and to the crowd on the fringe. If anyone would come after me he must do three things: 1. deny himself. 2. take up his cross. 3. follow me.

Our Lenten journey is a journey with Jesus as we follow Jesus. So this morning we will think about these three things, what it means to us today, denying oneself, taking up the cross, and following Jesus Christ. Denying oneself means more than giving up something for Lent. Some people will say, "I am giving up chocolate candy for Lent or I am giving up coffee or I am giving up computer game. Although you could deny yourself something such as this, Jesus was talking about something different from that. He was talking about the process of becoming his true disciple. If anyone wants to be my disciple then he has to be different from what he is now. The people in the crowds had no real commitment to him--his disciples were on the way but even Peter had a lack of understanding. What does the word "deny" mean anyway? The Greek word used here is a strong word. It is the same used for when Peter denied Jesus in the courtyard--it means to state that you have no connection with something--to state that you are not connected in any way to whatever is in view. Deny here is not the same as what we usually mean by self denial when we are giving up something. What Jesus was saying is that God is to be at the centre of life; The whole world is designed to function with God at its centre, so when you put yourself or anyone or anything else there, it all goes wrong. That's what Jesus was getting at when he said, "Seek first the Kingdom of God (that is, the God centred life – seek that first) then everything else that you need will be yours as well." That's what Jesus did. The Kingdom was first in his life. God was at the centre of his life. So, if we want to follow him, to be his disciples, we must deny ourselves first place, and allow God to have first place. And when we do, then everything will fit together and life will be what it is intended to be.

How about Taking Up His Cross? What does taking up the cross mean? Some people think they are taking up the cross when they are suffering with sickness and disease. Others think it is suffering some trial or hardship. Some of you might say, "What is my cross?" Remember the story of Jesus' praying in the Garden of Gethsemane. Jesus did not want to die. He could see the cross looming before him, and he did not want to die – not then, so early in his life – and not like that – so painful, so lonely, so rejected. The struggle was so intense that sweat appeared on his brow like great drops of blood. But finally, he received the grace necessary to pray the greatest prayer that can be prayed. He prayed, "Not my will, but your will be done." So, the cross we are called to bear is the same as the cross Jesus was called to bear. The cross is the cross of obedience. That's difficult. Again and again, I have had people tell me that the single most difficult thing about being a disciple is giving up control. We want to decide what commandments we will obey and which we will not. We want to decide whom we will love and under what circumstances we will serve. To give up control is not easy. But when we come to know that God is like Jesus, that he really loves us and cares about us, then we can trust that he knows what is best for us and that he wants what is best for us. Once we know that, really know that, then we can pray, "Not my will, but your will be done." Jesus says, "Take up your cross the cross of obedience."

Then, Jesus says, "Come, follow me." What does it mean by that? Jesus called his first century disciples and he calls us, saying, "Come, follow me." The question of all questions is, "Does he know where he is going? Is that where I want to go, too?" That's important because who you follow not only determines where you go, it also profoundly shapes what you experience and who you become along the way. Jesus' first century disciples lived with Jesus, listened to Jesus, learned from Jesus. And, day by day, something of Jesus' spirit began to be imprinted upon them. They began to see with the eyes of Jesus. They began to feel and care with the heart of Jesus. They began to reach out compassionately with the hands of Jesus. Over time, they began to look and sound like Jesus. And, they turned the world upside down. Of course, it's not always easy. Following Jesus does lead to a cross, you know. But, Jesus never said it was easy. Remember the man who said to Jesus, "Lord, I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus cautioned him, "The foxes have holes, and the birds have their nests, but I don't even have a place to lay my head." He did not say it would be easy. But he did promise to be with us. He did promise to give us everything we need for the journey. And he promised that following him will lead to abundant life, eternal life. To follow Jesus means that, over time, by keeping company with him, by opening ourselves to him, we begin to look and sound like him. And when we do, we become "the body of Christ," we become the best we will ever be, and life becomes the best it can be.

Friends in Christ. We marked with ashes in the sign of the cross on Ash Wednesday and we prayed that we would remember Jesus and follow him. To follow Jesus - to live a life that looks and sounds like Jesus - it's not easy. But it's the hope of the world. And it's the best hope of your life and my life. "If any want to be my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." That's what he said to his disciples 2000 years ago and that is what he says to all of us here this morning as we walk together Lent toward the cross. Amen.

From heaven you came helpless babe, entered our world your glory veiled; not to be served but to serve, and give your life that we might live.

(Refrain) This is our God, the Servant King, he calls us now to follow him, to bring our lives as a daily offering of worship to the Servant King. There in the garden of tears, my heavy load he chose to bear; his heart with sorrow was torn, "Yet not my will, but yours," he said. (*Refrain*)

Come see his hands and his feet, the scars that speak of sacrifice, hands that flung stars into space to cruel nails surrendered. (*Refrain*)

So let us learn how to serve and in our lives enthrone him; each other's needs to prefer, for it is Christ we're serving. (*Refrain*)
