

Word for the Day

Jesus wants to take the disciples somewhere they've never been before — to 'go across to the other side' (Mark 4:35). In the process, Jesus is asking his followers to leave behind what is comfortable and safe. They're heading over to 'the other side' into gentile territory, a journey into the unknown. Perhaps then, it shouldn't surprise us to learn that as they set out, they are immediately confronted by a great windstorm that whips up. The waves start beating into the boat. They feel as if the danger and threat are rising beyond manageable limits. We know this experience. We know what it's like to feel swamped on every side when we launch into new things. At this point in Mark's story, fear takes over. Anxiety is now calling the shots. And yet, in the midst of the storm, Jesus sleeps (v. 38).

Seas and storms and terrified seamen are not foreign to the biblical imagination. This story drags us into Jonah territory – another Hebrew asleep in the hull while storms rage from every side (Jonah 1:4–6). In this older story, Jonah is the biblical anti-hero, immature and asleep at the wheel, fleeing from God's call on his life. Jonah is tragically given to attitudes and agendas at odds with God's heart for all people. He harbours only parochial interests; his world is far too small to include outsiders. And yet, despite his reluctance to act, he remains the one who holds the fate of his seafaring companions in his hands.

We are drawn into this ancient tension as the storm rises among Jesus' company. Jonah is asleep, indifferent to outsiders. Is Israel asleep, indifferent to outsiders? Jesus' own disciples are subject to this age-old Jonah-condition. Jonah encapsulates the disciples' fear and mistrust of outsiders. Can Jonah, and by extension Jesus' disciples, discover a heart that beats for those beyond their own small world of relationships?

In the midst of this storm and in the heart of this tension lies Jesus. Jesus is the one who is already with them in the midst of the chaos, danger and threat. Jesus is right there with us in our experience, tending to our own Jonah-condition. Jesus enters into our indifference and fear to lead us into greater love. It's in this place that Christ can calm the storms, creating peace and stillness where our fears used to live (v. 39). This Jesus can teach us how to be at ease in the chaos. He can help us to find rest even

while heading out into newness. He is always expanding the smallness of our worlds. He mentors us in the way of engagement, the life of faith, a way that transforms us so that we can have a transforming presence in the world.

Ideas for Reflection

- What are the biggest adventures you have embarked on and experienced?
- What would it look like to 'go across to the other side' (to leave behind what is comfortable and safe)?
- Reflect on an experience that once made you feel anxious but have now learned to be at ease in. How did this happen?
- What gifts might be birthed out of the storms of life? What might we learn about God and about ourselves in this?
- Reflect on how pearls are formed something precious and beautiful that begins as an irritant within an oyster.



Poetry as a contemplative practice

Instructions

- Try to let your mind drop into your heart as you quietly read or listen to the poem. You might like to start by centring on your breath.
- 2. Read or listen to the poem through more than one time.
- 3. Notice what arises in you each time.

This activity is a way of entering into the scriptural themes in a contemplative way – not unlike how one might engage in a *lectio divina* process.
