Scriptures

2 Samuel 6:1-5, 12b-19

With great celebration, King David brings the Ark of God into the City of David to be amongst the people.

Psalm 24

The psalmist sings of God's majesty and sovereignty over all things.

Ephesians 1:3-14

The letter to the Ephesians begins with praise to God for the blessings received in Christ.

Mark 6:14-29

King Herod's wife, Herodias, requests that John the baptiser is beheaded.

Theme Focus

Two stories of power, celebration, and dancing raise questions about the misuse of power and the injustice it causes

Word for the Day

The installation of the Ark of God in Jerusalem was a pivotal moment for David in the establishment of his kingdom. Not only did it legitimise David's power and leadership, but it also set Jerusalem as the royal and religious capital. This occurred through liturgy, ritual, and a great dancing and feasting ceremony. We must not pretend that this display of power was not

at the expense of others. David obliterated the Philistine army to take Jerusalem in the preceding chapter.

In the reading from Mark, we find ourselves at a birthday feast. Herod's daughter dances for him, and he is so pleased that he offers her anything she pleases as a gift. Unsure of what to ask, she asks her mother for advice. John the baptiser is imprisoned, and Herod is sympathetic and interested in his message. John, however, is critical of Herod's taking his brother's wife. This does not please Herodias, so she takes the opportunity to manipulate the situation by having her daughter ask for John's head. Herod is distressed but cannot go back on his promise.

Ideas for Reflection

A few themes could be followed from these readings:. One possibility is to explore the issues of power further. We cannot avoid power. It is natural that in many relationships, there will be imbalances in power. How we use this power is key. The characters in today's readings used and abused it in different ways.

- Where and when do we see power used to harm?
- When and where do we see power used for good?

Another possibility is to explore the position in which Herod found himself. It is not unusual to find ourselves caught between two people and needing to make good decisions. The poem 'Herod's dilemma' (next page) addresses how Herod may have felt. The poem might initiate discussion around difficult situations we find ourselves in and how to discern in those moments where we have power.

Poetry as a contemplative practice

Instructions

- Try to let your mind drop into your heart as you quietly read or listen to the poem. You might like to start by centring on your breath.
- 2. Read or listen to the poem through more than one time.
- 3. Notice what arises in you each time.

This activity is a way of entering into the scriptural themes in a contemplative way – not unlike how one might engage in a *lectio divina* process.

Herod's dilemma

like a possum caught in headlights kangaroo stuck on a fence whale stranded at Farewell Spit koala in a bushfire pastry flattened by a rolling pin shirt put through the wringer driftwood bobbing in a tidal rip rubber band stretched to breaking



The hole he fell into was a trap – family versus whistle-blower Queen versus prophet sly versus courage

Could he turn the clock back?
Renegotiate the deal?
Can you break a promise if
the unexpected consequence is murder?
