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READING FROM THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES:

1 Kings 2:10-12, 3:3-14

¹⁰Then David slept with his ancestors, and was buried in the city of David. ¹¹The time that David reigned over Israel was forty years; he reigned seven years in Hebron, and thirty-three years in Jerusalem.

¹²So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David; and his kingdom was firmly established.

³Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of his father David; only, he sacrificed and offered incense at the high places. ⁴The king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there, for that was the principal high place; Solomon used to offer a thousand burnt offerings on that altar.

⁵At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, "Ask what I should give you." ⁶And Solomon said, "You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. ⁷And now, O Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. ⁸And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. ⁹Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?"¹⁰It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. ¹¹God said to him, "Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, ¹²I now do according to your word. Indeed I give you a wise and discerning mind; no one like you has been before you and no one like you shall arise after you. ¹³I give you also what you have not asked, both riches and honor all your life; no other king shall compare with you.¹⁴If you will walk in my ways, keeping my statutes and my commandments, as your father David walked, then I will lengthen your life."

READING FROM THE CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES:

John 6:51-58

⁵¹I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh." ⁵²The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" ⁵³So Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. ⁵⁴Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; ⁵⁵for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. ⁵⁶Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. ⁵⁷Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. ⁵⁸This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever."

REFLECTION: 1 Kings 2:10-12, 3:3-14, John 6:51-58.

A little child in church for the first time watched as the ushers passed the offering plates. When they neared the pew where he sat, the little boy told his father in a loud voice so that everyone could hear: "Daddy, don't pay for me, I'm under five." In the Bible, there are some difficult passages that don't appear to make much sense at all. Some passages in the Bible are guite confusing and sometimes tricky, and we read them and often we don't understand them. The story we have read together today is one of them. In the story, the way Jesus handles this situation is confusing, because some of the things Jesus is saying are upsetting his followers, and it seems that he does not make it easier, but harder for them. Our natural instinct is to take down any barriers in people's way and help them get past those barriers. If someone finds something hard to understand, we want to explain it. If someone finds something difficult, we want to make it easier. If there is something in their way, we want to move it. And certainly this is what we would expect of Jesus. But what is surprising is that this is not what Jesus does. Instead of making it easier to believe, he seems to make it harder. Jesus says, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day. For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in him". "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" they said. It offended them greatly. At this, the Bible says that the people said to each other, "This is a hard teaching. Who can accept it?" And many of his disciples turned back and no longer followed him. The question is, why did Jesus do that? Why? It was really hard for them to understand what Jesus was saying about eating the flesh and drinking the blood.

One Sunday morning, an elderly pastor found a small box containing 6 eggs and a hundred one-dollar bills deep in the wardrobe. He called his wife into the wardrobe to ask her about the box and its contents. Embarrassed, she admitted having hidden the box for the entire 30 years of their marriage. Disappointed and hurt, the pastor asked her, "Why?" The wife replied that she didn't want to hurt his feelings. He asked her how the box could have hurt his feelings. She said that every time he had delivered a poor sermon, she had placed an egg in the box. The pastor felt that 6 poor sermons in 30 years was certainly nothing to feel bad about, so he asked her what the one hundred one-dollar bills was for. She replied, "Each time I got a dozen eggs, I sold them to the neighbours for a dollar!" In defence of the elderly Pastor, I must say that sometimes God's word is not received well. We might hear things that we do not want to hear and so God's word is sometimes discomforting. This is more so when it falls on the ears of those who have a hard time believing. To the Corinthian Church the apostle Paul once said, "the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God". Yes, it is the power of God.

I have read the whole Bible from Genesis to Revelation many times. And I have done my preaching more than 2000 times for last 30 years. But I still believe that the Bible is sometimes hard to understand. One of the reasons for those confusions is the simple fact

that the Bible didn't drop from the hand of God in heaven. The Bible contains all sorts of stories, parables, reflections, cultures, traditions and events that all sorts of people had experienced about God. The Bible also contains many of the teachings and life stories of Jesus Christ, and the teachings and stories of the first century disciples who had learned from Jesus directly and indirectly. Though those 66 different books we have in the Bible were chosen in the careful and prayerful processes somewhere in the 4th Century, we are never to overlook the fact that those books were written by different individuals and aroups in different contexts over many centuries. That is why we have many questions and confusions as we read the Bible. We can't find answers to all of these questions. What I want to say is that the most important thing in reading our Bible is that we are to experience God through the stories of those who have lived and experienced God many centuries ago. We all know about God through the Bible but it is not all about God. As they have never learnt fully about God, we, too, can never do that. No matter how hard or often you read and study your Bible, you never fully know about God. So, it is never wise to claim our concepts of God against others because when we do that we are actually claiming our experiences of God to others. We only share with others our experiences and help them to experience God so they know what we're doing and saying. God is never fully understood. 'God is beyond all human understandings, God is all mystery, God is all knowing and all powerful'. Bible definitely contains the words and deeds of God, and the stories and experiences of the people who had experienced God, but it doesn't mean that the Bible itself is God. Careful interpretations, rightful reflections, and humble adaptations are must when you read your Bible. When you begin your Bible too literally, it often makes God stop breathing and living in your present contexts. God is never confined in human cultures like writings. If you want to write a biography about someone you know, it only contains all the stories and facts on that someone's life from the time of birth to the time of death of that someone. However, what if that someone that you attempt to write about never dies. How could you possibly contain all the facts and histories about that someone's life while you will die as a writer and that someone will never die as an object of your writing?

Verses 51 and 52 in John 6, 'I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If you eat this bread, you will live forever. The bread that I will give you is my flesh, which I give so that the world may live.' This started an angry argument among them. "How can this man give us his flesh to eat" they asked. Actually, it is a quite comforting story because it points out that our 21'st century Christians are not the only ones who so often try to read the Bible literally. The first century people who had heard Jesus directly must have been so mixed up to the point of being almost stupid. Jesus still says, "The bread I give you is my flesh, which I give so that the world may live." It is his invitation to you that you might come to him personally, and touch and taste him personally, and experience him personally. We celebrate Holy Communion on the second and the fourth Sunday of the month in our worship. We welcome everyone to participate. What is Holy Communion? At the communion table when the bread and wine is consecrated and blessed, it is no longer the bread and wine/juice from the store. The Spirit of God descends upon and enters these sacraments and it becomes holy and life giving. What is going on when we celebrate Holy Communion together? We believe that Holy Communion is a sacrament --

it is something visible that invites us to receive the invisible grace of God. What does it mean? We believe that when we gather to worship and participate together in the sacrament of Holy Communion, we are experiencing God's activity in our lives. We experience the presence of Jesus Christ that he is with us today, we experience Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for us, we experience God's power of love for us and for the whole world. We come to him personally, and touch and taste him personally, and experience him personally in our Holy Communion. To the believer, the body of Jesus is "Real food" and his blood is "Real drink". As you and I continue to feed on him spiritually and experience him personally, our lives will gradually be transformed and we will reach a point when it is no more that we live but Christ who lives in us. Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them."

Dear friends, we all know that God is everywhere but that God must start from somewhere to be experienced. Where is somewhere? Somewhere is you. You'll never know God until you experience him in your ordinary life and relationships. I want to ask you all this question. Do you experience God in your life? Do you feel God's presence in your life? Do you touch and taste God personally? This morning, God is calling you to experience him, his love on the cross, his power of love for us, his unconditional and everlasting love for us and for the whole world. Let us open our minds and hearts and ears together, and listen to God, and let's say, "Lord, I want to touch you, I want to taste you, I want to experience you." Amen.
