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The Service of the Word

BIBLE READINGS

Job 42: 10-17

10 And the Lord restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends, and the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before. 11 Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the Lord had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring. 12 The Lord blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning, and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand donkeys. 13 He also had seven sons and three daughters. 14 He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. 15 In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters, and their father gave them an inheritance along with their brothers. 16 After this Job lived one hundred and forty years and saw his children and his children's children, four generations. 17 And Job died, old and full of days.

Mark 10: 46-52

46 They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. 47 When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" 48 Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" 49 Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." 50 So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. 51 Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." 52 Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

REFLECTION

This morning, we hear the story of a man who is blind. His name is Bartimaeus. He is sitting by the roadside on the way up to Jerusalem - begging. Indeed, as a blind man that is likely all that he can do. Without his sight, he, like most blind people of his day - and indeed ours, is cut off from the normal transactions of daily life. He can't see the sun rise, he can't support himself by the labour of his hands, he can't see the expressions on the faces of his parents or his brothers and sisters or anyone else. He dwells in darkness. He is cut off, isolated - and for the most part he is regarded as a burden by all - by his family and by society. A burden - nothing more - and nothing less. One day, as he sits by the side of the road begging, he is aware that a large crowd is approaching - and he hears that Jesus is approaching. He heard about Jesus. He heard about his miracles. He knew that he is a healer. He knew that he has power. So he cries out - he cries out loudly so that he may be heard, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me".

Despite being rebuked by those around him, Bartimaeus does not waver; he shouts even louder, desperate for the healing he knows Jesus can provide. We know how the rest of the story goes. Jesus stops and says to those near to him, "Call him." And they do. And Bartimaeus throws his coat away and jumps to his feet and comes to Jesus. Jesus asks him "What do you want me to do for you?" He replies, "Rabbi, I want to see." And Jesus has mercy on him and says "Go, your faith has healed you." Instantly, Bartimaeus regains his sight and chooses to follow Jesus, becoming a disciple instead of seeking merely a new life for himself.

"Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me." A prayer of desperation - and a prayer of faith. This is a meditation - and a prayer - for millions upon millions of people a

prayer expressed for over 20 centuries - a prayer that is part of my life and which may well be - or should be - a part of your life.

"Lord, have mercy on me."

My life is out of control. All that I love - has been taken from me. I have lost my job, my family, my health, I grieve and I see no light in front of me I dwell in darkness. "Lord, have mercy on me."

There was a young man who wanted a job as a signalman at his local train station. For his interview, he was told to meet the inspector at the signal box. The inspector asked him, "What would you do if you realized that two trains were heading toward each other on the same track?" The young man answered, "That's easy. I would switch the points for one of the trains." "The inspector then asked, "What if the lever broke?" The young man said, "Then I'd jump down out of the signal box and use the manual lever over there." The inspector asked again, "What if the manual lever had been broken down?" The young man said, "Then, I would run to the signal box and phone the next signal box to let them know what was happening." The inspector continued on, "What if the phone was out of order?" The young man said, "Oh, well, in that case, I would run into town and get my uncle." That answer puzzled the inspector. So, he asked, "Why would you go get your uncle?" The young man answered, "That's simple. Because he's never seen a train crash before."

Too many people today feel that their life is headed toward a crash. Their life feels like two trains headed directly toward each other and there is really nothing they can do about it. For many people today, a crash seems inevitable, whatever it is. For many people, including us this morning, life seems to have come unglued and untracked. They feel as if they are 'partly on track' and 'partly off track'. Life is full of challenges—problems that seem to multiply endlessly. In our moments of frustration, we too need to cry out, just as Bartimaeus did: "Lord, have mercy on me. Change my life, O Lord." Jesus changed Bartimaeus and he touched his life, his old life, the life with full of sufferings and problems. And Jesus gave him a new life, the life he can enjoy so much.

A man in his twenties wanted to change the world. So he prayed to God, "Lord, give me the power to change the world." As he turned thirty, he came to realise that he couldn't change the world. So he changed his prayer into, "Lord, give me the power to change my country." Time passed and he still realised he couldn't change his country. So he began to pray, "Lord, give me the power to change my town. He became middle aged but realised his prayer wouldn't be answered. So he changed his prayer, "Lord, give me the power to change my family." As time went and he became older and older, however, he learned he couldn't change his own family at all. Now he was very old and weak. One day he was reflecting on his life and realised

that he couldn't change anything, even his own children. It's like his whole life is a total failure. So he stopped praying. Instead, he came to Lord, asking a humble request, "Lord, you know I have lived my whole life as your child, trying to do everything to change the world, the society, the friends, and my wife and my children. But Lord I've realised now I failed everything. Lord, for the last time, allow me to make this request of you. Change me, Lord, change me." He continued to get older and weaker but he continued to change. Soon he realised that his family began to change with him. And his society. Probably his country, too. Our Christian faith never promises us a rose garden. We pray, cry, yell and shout but we soon realise our lives are full of problems. So we are confused and taken aback and try everything to sort it out but there is always another problem, problem, problem. When we pray to God, or when we come to Lord, or when we live our lives as parent, husband, wife, when we live our normal life, we need to see what the real problem is. We need to learn to pray. We need to learn to cry out. Lord, have mercy on me.

In the Book of Job, we see a righteous man who faced unimaginable loss and suffering yet refused to curse God. In the conclusion of this story, we hear that Job repents of his attitude - the attitude that questions the goodness of God towards him, saying to God, "My ears had heard of you, but now my eyes have seen you. Therefore, I repent in dust and ashes." "Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner". Job repents and receives from God a new life, a new life with a new blessings - children, land, a wife, wealth, and length of days in which to enjoy them.

As I stand before you today, I urge you to embrace the humility of Bartimaeus and the repentance of Job. This prayer, so simple yet so profound, invites us to lay our burdens before God. I cannot guarantee that this prayer will magically restore your health or bring back lost opportunities. But I can promise you this: it will lead you to a new life—one that is filled with hope and purpose. Just as Bartimaeus received his sight and chose to follow Jesus, and Job received a new beginning, we too can experience transformation through prayer. What will we do? We who are hurting? We who like Job, may be angry at God? We who like Bartimaeus may be suffering an affliction? All I can say is this: pray. Pray with Bartimaeus, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me." Pray with all those around the world who seek God's mercy, "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." Pray it again and again, and God will answer. He will touch your life, change your circumstances, and grant you a new beginning. Amen.
