Scriptures

Ruth 3:1–5; 4:13–17

This portion from Ruth 3 and 4 portrays the story as a 'romance' that culminates in the marriage of Ruth and Naomi's relative, Boaz. The reading omits the risky, risque journey from Naomi and Ruth as two widows subsisting together to the arrival of a baby boy on Naomi's lap.

Psalm 127

This psalmist advocates for God as a foundation for life's work and activities, saying , 'Unless it is God who builds the house, those who build it labour in vain.'

Hebrews 9:24–28 continues to unfold the image in last week's passage, likening the work of Christ to the work of priests and sacrifices in the sacrificial system. Here, the writer argues that Christ's work is unique and does not need to be repeated.

Mark 12:38-44

Jesus reflects on poor widows and powerful men. Jesus expresses his solidarity with and cares for widows, one widow in particular.

Theme Focus

'A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny...' ~ Mark 12: 42

This week, we see the widow hidden in the shadows, who Jesus points out to us, think about the parts of the Ruth story omitted in the lectionary, and ask what it would mean to notice people, places, and situations we usually overlook.

Word for the Day

The readings from Ruth are a strange combination – the beginning of chapter 3 and the near end of chapter 4. We read of Naomi's plan to seek security for herself and for Ruth once the harvests had come to an end. We then skip over the events that played out as Ruth put her body into a high-risk situation, seeking out Boaz in the night and not following the instructions of her mother-in-law as she confronts Boaz. We skip over the bargaining of men at the city gates to possess land and women. This 'business' sees Boaz claim both Ruth and a field belonging to Naomi by tricking another relative. We skip over these shady encounters and only read the story in its quick movement from marriage to son, the silence of Ruth (and Naomi), and the folding of this story into the story of King David.

What happens when we read the portions the lectionary overlooks...do we feel comfortable about the actions taking place? Does this feel like a story where everyone is looking after each other... or do we see imbalances of power playing out?

How do we grapple with a story like Ruth, where the characters seem both to be motivated by care for each other and ruthless in seeking their own survival?

The lectionary is a wonderful tool for our reflection, but the lectionary also makes choices about which stories we focus on and which we overlook.

Ideas for Reflection

- You might like to read Ruth 3 and 4 in full. What do you notice?
- What do you make of what the lectionary leaves in and what is overlooked?

Poetry as a contemplative practice

Instructions

- 1. Try to let your mind drop into your heart as you quietly read or listen to the poem. You might like to start by centring on your breath.
- 2. Read or listen to the poem through more than one time.
- 3. Notice what arises in you each time.

This activity is a way of entering into the scriptural themes in a contemplative way – not unlike how one might engage in a *lectio divina* process.

Take my gifts and let me love you,

God who first of all loved me,

gave me light and food and shelter,

gave me life and set me free.

Now because your love has touched me,

I have love to give away,

now the bread of love is rising,

loaves of love to multiply!

Take the fruit that I have gathered from the tree your Spirit sowed, harvest of your own compassion, juice that makes the wine of God, spiced with humour, laced with laughter-flavour of the Jesus life, tang of risk and new adventure, taste and zest beyond belief. Take whatever I can offer--

gifts that I have yet to find,

skills that I am slow to sharpen,

talents of the hand and mind,

things made beautiful for others

in the place where I must be:

take my gifts and let me love you,

God who first of all loved me.
