REFLECTION

Christmas is just around the corner—only three days left! As we celebrate this Advent season, it's a time of blessings. The greatest blessing we have is the gift of eternal life, made possible by Christ coming into the world. Through His sacrifice on the cross, He paid the price for our sins, allowing us to have fellowship with God. As John 3:16 reminds us, "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." Because of Jesus, we can look forward to spending eternity with God. There can be no greater blessing than that. But as we reflect on the season of Advent, we also see that throughout scripture, there are people who were blessed by God in special ways. Two people who stand out to me in this season are Mary and Elizabeth.

In today's gospel reading from Luke 1, we see these two remarkable women— Elizabeth and Mary. They were separated in age by about thirty years, and though they were blood relatives, their social standing would have been quite different. Elizabeth was the wife of a priest, which gave her some measure of status, while Mary, likely a young peasant girl, had no such privilege. Yet, they both had something in common—a deep faith in God and a willingness to be used by him. Elizabeth and her husband Zechariah had longed for a child throughout their marriage but had been unable to conceive. Then, suddenly, God promised that they would have a son. His name would be John, and he would "minister with the spirit and power of Elijah" (Luke 1:17). Six months later, Mary received a visit from the angel Gabriel, who told her that she had found favour with God. She would bear a child who would be called "the Son of the Most High." When Mary questioned how this could happen, since she was not yet married, the angel assured her that the Holy Spirit would come upon her, and the child to be born would be holy, called the Son of God (Luke 1:35). The angel also told her that her relative Elizabeth was in her sixth month of pregnancy. At this point, Mary hurriedly went to visit Elizabeth. But why did Mary go with such urgency? It might have been a reflection of her obedience to God's plan revealed through the angel. But we can also imagine that Mary, as a young, perhaps around 15 years of age, unmarried girl pregnant with child, felt a strong need for comfort and understanding. After all, in her day, this would have been a scandal—something that would have likely brought shame and judgment from those around her. So, where might she go to find comfort? She went to her relative Elizabeth, where, instead of judgment, she was met with joy. Elizabeth greeted her with these words: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!" What a powerful declaration! What a relief for Mary to hear those words after likely feeling the weight of judgment and shame. It was like cool water on a hot day or a soft chair after being on your feet for hours. Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, not only offered Mary acceptance but declared her a blessing, along with the child she carried. There's a lot happening in this story, but what stands out to me is how much we need more Elizabeths in this world. We need more people who will look past judgment and offer God's blessings instead. People who see God's redeeming work in others, even when the world may not. We need to be those who, like Elizabeth, see others as God sees them and offer them his blessing.

Let me share a story that illustrates the power of offering blessings, no matter the situation: One Sunday after church, a pastor was walking home when he came across a homeless man sitting on a park bench. The man looked up and asked, "Hey, mister, can you spare some change?" The pastor smiled warmly and replied, "I don't have any money on me, but I can offer you something much more valuable: a blessing!" The homeless man looked at him skeptically and said, "A blessing? What's that gonna do for me?" The pastor chuckled and said, "Well, a blessing comes from God, and it's powerful. I bless people all the time, and it can bring joy, peace, and hope." The man thought for a moment and then said, "Well, if a blessing is that good, I'll take one!" So the pastor placed his hand gently on the man's shoulder and said, "May God bless you with warmth and comfort, peace in your heart, and provision in your life. May you find the strength to face whatever comes your way." The homeless man looked up with a smile and said, "You know, I think that was the best thing I've heard all day. But just to make sure, can you also spare some change?" This light-hearted story reflects the theme of blessings and how simple acts of kindness can have a big impact, much like Elizabeth's blessing to Mary. It's a reminder that offering blessings can lift others up, no matter the situation. Whether through words, prayers, or small acts of kindness, we have the power to bless others.

So, in this Advent season, let us be like Elizabeth—people who offer blessings. Let us see others as God sees them, not through the lens of judgment but through the lens of grace and love. As we wait for the coming of Christ, let our hearts overflow with the desire to bless those around us. The Season of Advent is all about being a blessing. Advent brought us the greatest blessing we could ever have: the gift of salvation through Jesus Christ. Amen.
