Scriptures for Epiphany +32

Nehemiah 8:1–3, 5–6, 8–10 describes Ezra reading from the Torah scrolls to the Israelites who have returned from the exile.

Psalm 19 celebrates the teaching and instructions of God in the Torah. Creation calls out its praise of God's glory and the goodness of God's words.

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

This well-known passage from St Paul to the Corinthian church describes the church using the metaphor of the human body. The many people who make up the church are all valued and have an important contribution to make, as with the different parts of the body.

Luke 4:14–21 marks the beginning of Jesus' public ministry as told by the gospel of Luke. Jesus reads from the scroll of Isaiah in the synagogue of Nazareth, proclaiming what is described by Isaiah as 'the year of the Lord's favour.'

Theme Focus

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. ~ Luke 4:18.

We listen as Jesus proclaims good news from the scroll of Isaiah and consider how we might bear witness to this good news, transforming our lives and our communities through love and justice.

Word for the Day

Hearing the story of Jesus reading from the scroll of Isaiah can remind us of the world around us. We are made mindful of the times and places where freedom is not seen or experienced close by and further away. Our hearts can break at the brokenness we see. Our cheeks can burn with the shame of recognising our own part in this brokenness. We might feel overwhelmed about what to do to break out of systems and ways of living that perpetuate injustice.

It is good to hear these words again and to think about how we can live into the vision Jesus draws attention to.

Ideas for Reflection

John Howell offers the following poem and introductory reflection.

Spirit of the ruru (more-pork)

Ruru are strongly associated with the spirit world in Maori Mythology. It is a kaitiaki/guardian, a bird of warning, of wisdom, a bird


who has the power to protect, warn and advise. The high pitch cry is believed to be the warning, the low cry is believed to be a sign of good.

For me, spirit is not a ghost, but that which moves us – in which we live and move and have our being.

Ruru call in the silent night, hidden in shadows still quiet. The presence of a guardian friend is a treasure, a spiritual diet. Once on a run through a bush reserve, one flew head high, broke my trance, parked on a branch. We just watched. Just the two of us face to face.

Its wide eyed stare still eyeballs me, unsettles my comfortable stand. Is it an insight about life and death as guardian in the land? Its plaintive call from the valley bush rings like a bell in the dark. Is it a peal to open a gate, or an alarm to wake my heart? This guardian spirit of Māori lore is our taonga in Aotearoa. In life or death our spirit can steer our children and all who follow. Ruru call in the silent night, hidden in shadows still quiet.
