

Scriptures for Epiphany 2

Isaiah 62:1-5

The prophet's voice calls out an intercession on behalf of Jerusalem. Knowing that God has promised restoration, the word of the text is that despite the experience of destruction and the difficulty of return, Jerusalem will again flourish and be renewed.

Psalm 36:5–10 praises the height, depth and breadth of God's loyal, loving kindness.

1 Corinthians 12:1–11

Paul writes about the different experiences that members within the Corinthian community have of the Holy Spirit. Acknowledging that people experience the outworkings of their faith differently, Paul points to the unity in this diversity. The key is that the gift and experience of the Spirit is for the sake of the common good.

John 2:1–11

This story recounts the first sign or miracle recounted by the gospel of John. At a wedding in Cana, at the behest of his mother, Jesus turns water into the very best of wine.

Theme Focus

'To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.' \sim 1 Cor 12:7

As we open the first letter to the church in Corinth, we reflect on how our encounters with God awaken our gifts and passions, urging us to work together for the common good of all.

Word for the Day

Epiphany refers to an appearance of the divine, an encounter with God. Today's passage from the letter of Paul to the church in Corinth makes us wonder about how the Corinthians encountered and experienced the Spirit of God among them.

Responding to a question or situation that we are not privy to, Paul encourages the Corinthians to celebrate and use their diverse encounters with God and the gifts and passions this calls out of them. Each member of the community seems to express their encounter with the God of Jesus a little differently. Paul suggests that the experience of God's gracious and steadfast love leads some to wisdom, compassion, speaking truth, discernment, prayerfulness, listening and more, each understood as unique gifts from God's Spirit. Paul seeks to emphasise that when such qualities are called out of Jesus' followers because they have encountered God they ought to be gifts that build up the community and lead to flourishing. In other words, from their difference, these gifts are to be shared and used for the common good.

Ideas for Reflection

- A famous quote by Frederick Buechener says, 'The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet.' Do you find this quote helpful or unhelpful? Why?
- How do you understand some of the different gifts that Paul describes?
- What might it look like for our encounter with God to be seen tangibly in the 'common good,' not just for ourselves or our community of faith but for all our neighbours and neighbourhoods?

DAY OF MOURNING Introduction 19 January 2025

In 2024 the Uniting Church in Australia and the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC) joyfully celebrated 30 years of a covenant relationship under God. Made

in honesty about our history and sustained by hope for the future, the Covenant has been a guiding light in our journey towards a more just Church and nation.

Woven together by threads of love, faith and a vision for God's justice and healing, we have chosen to walk together as First and Second Peoples, sharing in joy and sorrow on the journey to reconciliation.

In this spirit of commitment, we are invited to observe the Uniting Church **Day of Mourning** on this Sunday 19 January

Now in its fifth year, the *Day of Mourning* was established by the Assembly in 2018 at the request of the UAICC, building on Congress' legacy of prophetic leadership including the creation of Congress itself and the Covenant. This day expresses our deep desire that truth, justice, healing and hope will shape our life as First and Second Peoples all across this vast southland.

For countless generations before colonisation, First Peoples lived in this ancient place, custodians of its lands, skies, and waterways. They cared for creation with profound wisdom and harmony, sustained by the Spirit of God who was always present with them.

The brutal settlement of these lands now called Australia devastated the oldest living culture on earth. Since that time First Peoples have known forced intervention, genocide, dispossession, incarceration, the loss of language, culture, family and story. The great wounds at the heart of our nation will remain unhealed until we can reckon with the full truth of our history.

As Second Peoples from many lands, we must understand how we continue to benefit from grave injustices of the past and present.

The *Day of Mourning* asks us to listen deeply and learn humbly, and bear one another's burdens. It is a moment to receive the outstretched hand of friendship offered in grace and hope, and to trust in Jesus, whose reconciling love continues to mend the brokenness within and among us.

The same ancient Spirit of God which has always been present in these lands has given us 'a destiny together' as the body of Christ in this time and place. This is also a day to celebrate survival and the immense gift we have in each other, giving thanks for the transformative and boundless love of Christ which holds us.

As the President of the Uniting Church in Australia and National Chairperson of the UAICC, we pray that the roots of our covenant will grow deep into the soil of truth and friendship and grow new shoots of justice and healing for our Church and nation.

May the blessing of God - the Ancient of Days, Jesus, the embodiment of justice, and the Spirit, the eternal animator of Creation - be on us and remain with us.
