Scriptures for Epiphany + 5

Isaiah 6:1-8, (9-13)

God summons and sends Isaiah, whole and holy.

Psalm 138

God increases the strength of our souls, caring for us in the face of our struggles.

1 Corinthians 15:1-11

We are what we are - gracious participants in God's resurrection movement.

Luke 5:1-11

Jesus opens up new storylines in Simon Peter's life, inviting him to push out into the depths to discover who he is becoming.

Theme Focus

As Jesus called Simon Peter to push out into deeper waters, we too are summoned to step beyond our doubts and discomfort, trusting God's guidance and daring to participate in God's dream for the world.

Word for the Day

The whole episode in this passage begins with Jesus' words for Simon Peter to push out into the depths. What happens following this point inaugurates a new storyline in Simon Peter's life – a storyline that draws him beyond the limitations of his own imagination alongside barriers of fear

and unworthiness. Jesus reveals who Simon Peter is becoming. Simon Peter's life will no longer simply be about *him*. Now Simon Peter is about *life*.

This is the big transformation that happens in human lives when we encounter Jesus' summons and invitation to push out into the deep. This is the God-life in all of us. We are always being summoned to push out into the depths – often in ways that will make us feel uncomfortable, that will touch our sense of inadequacy, our shortcomings, our doubts, and our fears. But this same God-life-in-us will also touch our spirit of adventure, our joy, our mysterious sense of the possible against all odds.

To push out into the depths is profoundly challenging and vulnerable. Luke's jubilee vision (Luke 4:15–21) will involve great and risky acts of love. It will pull us into unlikely movements of solidarity, generosity, and forgiveness. This God-life-in-us transforms the very ground beneath our feet. But like those who have gone before us, we may well catch ourselves, by the whiff of God's Spirit within us, uttering the most daring thing we can say: 'Yet if you say so...'

Ideas for Reflection

Jesus hops into one of the boats and asks Simon Peter to put the boat out a little way from the shore. Jesus needs his help. Jesus needs his considerable sea-and-boat skills so he can address the crowds from his boat-pulpit. Simon Peter is side-by-side with Jesus, controlling the drift of Jesus' boat. Because of Simon Peter's skilful activity, Jesus can hold the attention of the crowd and reel them in with his imaginative and life-giving words.

You are invited to reflect on your various skills, qualities, experiences, and capacities. How might these bring aliveness into the world?

Peter's encounter with Jesus shapes what he knows of God and also what he understands about himself.

Reflect on the stories and experiences from your own lives that have altered your storylines about God and yourselves.

Jesus asks Peter to push out into the depths.

Reflect on what this might have meant in your own experiences.

- What are your "Yet if you say so..." experiences?
- What might it mean at this time of your life?
- What risk or vulnerability might be part of these experiences?
- In what way might joy or excitement be part of your experiences?

Here is a song we sing to help in your reflections on this theme

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Instructions

- 1. As you quietly read the poem, try to let your mind drop into your heart as you quietly read the poem. You might like to start by centering on your breath.
- 2. Read the poem through more than one time.
- 3. Notice what arises in you as you read each time.
