Scriptures for Lent 5

Isaiah 43:16–21 has God bringing a hopeful message of a new thing that God is doing. The language used to describe this is a way being made through the sea and a way made through the wilderness.

Psalm 126

People would have sung this song as they made their way to Jerusalem. It is a song of joy for what God has done in the lives of the people.

Philippians 3:4b-14

Paul tells of the change that has happened for him in finding a life in Christ. The loss of worldly things has been all gained in Christ.

John 12:1-8

While Jesus dines with his friends in Bethany, Mary takes expensive perfume and pours it on Jesus' feet. Judas criticises Mary for her extravagant wastefulness. Jesus rebukes his remarks and validates Mary's action.

Theme Focus

As our Lenten journey concludes and Jerusalem comes into view, Isaiah's promise of a path through the wilderness and Mary's act of anointing Jesus' feet invite us to embrace the paradox of hope and sacrifice.

Word for the Day

The household of Lazarus, Mary, and Martha was quite familiar with a range of smells, according to John's gospel. In the previous chapter, the stench from Lazarus' dead body fills the area. Now we have the more pleasant fragrance of nard or spikenard. It may be difficult for us to comprehend the impact that this had on the people present.

Some of those present may have recalled their wedding day when the bride may have used nard to prepare herself for her husband. Times of intimacy and personal closeness were possibly recalled. Could this possibly be equated with the behaviour of this woman in such a public forum? Others may have been reminded of the consecration of a king. Could Mary have been hinting that Jesus was a king? Why, then, would she anoint his feet instead of his head, which was the acceptable practice? For most of those present, however, the rich fragrance would have been an all too vivid reminder of death. Many had probably used similar perfumes to embalm their own friends and relatives following their death. Surely, Mary did not wish death upon Jesus.

Mary's actions must have seemed so outlandish that those present merely saw them as acts of extravagance. What sort of a woman unties her hair in public? Who in their right mind would pour such a rare and expensive perfume over Jesus' feet? Could she not have sold the perfume and given the money to the needy? Surely, Jesus would agree with their thinking. This woman must be mad.

But Jesus did not agree. In fact, he defended Mary's actions. Mary had demonstrated an understanding of who Jesus was that went beyond the comprehension of those present. The wafting perfume not only told of her close relationship with Jesus but also of his impending death. Her prophetic action should have made it plainly clear who this man was and the depth of her devotion. She sees Jesus as the way she wants to follow; He is the way through the wilderness.

Ideas for Reflection

- Is there a right time and place to worship God?
- Are there correct procedures that we need to follow?
- Does it happen only in the church on Sunday mornings?

Mary has shown us that worship is a spontaneous and natural overflowing of our life. This could well make us appear foolish and naïve.

- When we come before God in worship, do we come with our hair flowing? Are we vulnerable and true to ourselves? Or do we try to appear holy to those who may be watching, being overly careful with our words and actions?
- So, what of the fragrance that resulted from Mary's worship? The sweet fragrance filled the house. What fragrance does our worship release into the air? What does this perfume stir in the minds of others? If the actions of our lives contradict each other, will not the aroma of our worship be confusing and difficult to identify?
- How does the aroma of our community's worship demonstrate the path that God has made in the wilderness to our society?


The Anointing at Bethany

Today, we celebrate the feast of *St Oscar Romero*.

Oscar was a man of deep wisdom whose life was steeped in the Word of God and who chose to throw in his lot with the poor and oppressed in his country of El Salvador. He became "God's microphone" and his people's microphone speaking the language of justice, truth, freedom from oppression and love. He gave his life for his people when he was gunned down while celebrating the Eucharist on 24 March 1980.

The beautiful quote from Teilhard de Chardin sums up his life: "Someday, after we have mastered the winds, the waves, the tides and gravity, we shall harness the energies of love. Then, for the second time in the history of the world, humanity will have discovered fire."
