Scriptures

2 Kings 2:1-2, 6-14

Elijah ascends in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha becomes swept up into a different kind of whirlwind—the invitation and challenge to carry forward Elijah's mantle and to follow in the great traditions of liberation like those who have gone before.

Psalm 77:1-2, 11-20

The psalmist cries out in desperation and is carried by memories and vivid images of God's delivering love.

Galatians 5:1, 13-25

The Holy Spirit produces beautiful fruit in our lives that allows us to take our place in God's freedom-bringing love.

Luke 9:51-62

Jesus both invites and challenges potential followers to reckon with what it means to take one's place in God's dream for greater peace, love, reconciliation, and unity.

Jesus invites potential followers to reckon with what discipleship really means.

Theme Focus

As Jesus shows us what following truly means, and Paul spells out the shape of life led by the Spirit, we are invited to step beyond what feels safe and familiar into a way of being shaped by love, freedom, and the Spirit's leading.

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Word for the Day

How is it that we might move beyond tribalism and division to take our part in God's dream for a renewed and reconciled world? Jesus in Luke 9:51–62 departures and relinquishments we must reckon with as part of following God into the ways of peace:

Letting go of judgement and condemnation (vv. 51—56):

Jesus' followers react with hostility to the poor reception they receive from the Samaritan villagers. Jesus rebukes them. Jesus asks his followers to embrace instead the risky, go-the-extra-mile way of embracing outsiders and enemies.

Letting go of ease and the need to remain close to the centre (vv. 57—58):

A would-be follower approaches Jesus and claims that they will follow him wherever he goes. Jesus does not hide what they would be in for. Jesus is the homeless one, the one who suffers outside the city gate for the sake of a greater wholeness (Hebrews 13:12).

Letting go of mere acceptance of the life script of the broader culture (vv. 59–60)

Jesus encounters another along the road who responds to Jesus' call by requesting to first go and bury his father. Kenneth Bailey suggests that man was referring to a son's traditional duty to remain at home and care for his parents until they are laid to rest respectfully (Bailey, K. Jesus Through Middle Eastern Eyes: Cultural Studies in the Gospels [2008]

Jesus responds by saying, 'Let the dead bury their own dead.' Jesus' call outweighs family obligations and cultural norms and cannot be postponed until we've got it all together: the time is always now.

Letting go of external validation and approval (vv. 61-62)

The third person Jesus encounters along the road tells Jesus that he will follow but wants to go and say goodbye to his family first. It is unlikely that this man is simply saying goodbye to his family. More likely, he is returning home to those who wouldn't just let this potential disciple wander off on some questionable enterprise. These are those external voices, those external expectations. Joining Jesus on the road is a call to be misunderstood at times, maybe even to disappoint important people.

Jesus, if we are willing, will guide us beyond the old divisions and the normal securities our lives are often grounded in. These encounters offer us windows into what it looks like to live into greater peace, love, reconciliation and unity.

Ideas for Reflection

You might like to invite to explore themes like:

- The stories of 'Us' and 'Them' and how natural it is to want to retaliate when we are hurt by others
- The pull of comfort, safety and security (emotional, financial, relational, etc.) in our lives
- The cultural/life scripts, hopes or expectations our lives are grounded in (i.e the 'Australian dream', etc.)
- The ways our lives are influenced by the expectations and pressures of others in our lives
- In reflecting on the episode with the third would-be disciple (vv. 6162), Dietrich Bonhoeffer says:

The trouble with this would-be disciple is that at the very moment he expresses his willingness to follow, he ceases to want to follow at all. By making his offer on his own terms, he alters the whole position, for discipleship can tolerate no conditions which might come between Jesus and our obedience to him' (The Cost of Discipleship, 1995, p.61) You might like to reflect on the challenges inherent to this quote.
