Scriptures

1 Kings 19:1–4, (5–7) 8–15a

Elijah, having fled to the wilderness, encounters God's sustaining stillness and hope in the midst of his fear and despair. Elijah hears God in the sound of sheer silence.

Psalms 42 and 43

Like Elijah, the psalmist pleads for an encounter with God's guidance and care. The human soul longs for God as a deer longs for flowing streams.

Galatians 3:23–29

We are all one in Christ Jesus—children of God through a faith that brings freedom.

Luke 8:26–39

Jesus takes the disciples to a place that is opposite Galilee—into Gentile territory—and brings healing, hope, and new community.

Theme Focus

As we hear Paul's words to the Galatians, we are invited to step beyond what divides us and into a love that unites, reflecting on ways to build bridges across differences and live as a community where all truly belong.

Word for the Day

We live in a divided world—a world separated sometimes by physical walls but far more often by various identifications that differentiate ourselves from others. Peter Rollins describes the way our beliefs and practices, shaped and developed by our various histories and contexts, create worlds of ‘us’ and ‘them’. (Peter Rollins, *The Idolatry of God* (Hodder & Stoughton, 2012))

Paul, in Galatians 3:23–29, mentions divisions along religious lines (Jew or Greek/Gentile), the political/economic (enslaved person or free), and biological (male and female). These lines of division defined and shaped the way these groups related to each other and were reinforced by the various authorities of the time.

We must not miss the profoundly radical nature of Paul’s words here. Paul is saying that, while these divisions continue to exist, to belong in Christ is to be bound no longer by these categories. None of these identities ought to define human dignity, relationships, or experience. Rather, it is participation in Christ that is key. For Paul, to be in Christ is to participate in the life of Christ, who self-empties (kenosis) and crosses over. See the gospel reading from this week where Jesus crosses over to a place that some translations describe as ‘opposite Galilee’ (Luke 8:26–39) in order to serve and embrace all of humanity in profound humility (Philippians 2:5–8). In the following weeks, we will explore the life and teachings of Christ:

- the difficult but necessary departures that we must make in order to take our place in God’s dream for the world (Luke 9:51–62)
- the necessary movement from a performance-identity to a participation-identity (Luke 10:1–11, 16:20)
- the risky, costly and confounding nature of transcending the things that divide us (Luke 10:25–37 and Luke 10:38–42)

We will see that to experience our belonging in Christ does not mean adding another category that divides. Rather, it is to hold all of these categories entirely differently.

Where once old categories separated, Christ now unites. Walls are dismantled. The 'other' becomes a sibling. Love binds. A profound and life-changing 'we' becomes our new foundation. As we move beyond tribalism, beautiful possibilities emerge as part of God's dream for a renewed and reconciled world.

Ideas for Reflection

- Consider your various memberships and the ways they, best you can tell, shape your beliefs, practices, relationships, and experience of the world (that is, your age, cultural background, gender, sexuality, education, religion/beliefs, economic participation, etc.)
- Where are there places you feel especially welcomed and celebrated?
- Where are there places where you might feel unwelcome or uncomfortable?
- Reflect on what it is like to consider the notion of no longer being bound by our various identifications in the same way.
- Reflect on times where a sense of belonging in Christ has cut across old categories of identification that might otherwise separate or divide.
- Reflect on ways we might hold our Christian faith in a way that adds further division and separation.
- How might our belonging in Christ help us to transcend divisions? What might be involved?

The sweet "well done" in judgment hour,

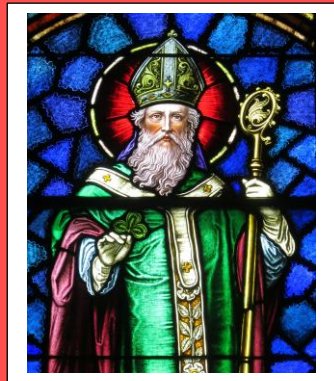
The service of the seraphim;

(From the Wayside Chapel) Dear Inner Circle,

Hope isn't about belief or preference, they are all too often arbitrarily allocated. It is an orientation of the spirit, and remains well within our locus of control. It allows us room to move in accordance with deeply held values, even though the odds against may seem overwhelming. Hope is an invitation to live life on purpose.

In this place then life can be a poetic protest — one that occasionally requires some pause in times when despair threatens to overwhelm. Wendell Berry is often a salve for the soul in such times, and I love the way his poem, "The Peace of Wild Things" describes this.

*When despair for the world grows in me
and I wake in the night at the least sound
in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be,
I go and lie down where the wood drake
rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds.
I come into the peace of wild things
who do not tax their lives with forethought
of grief. I come into the presence of still water.
And I feel above me the day-blind stars
waiting with their light. For a time
I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.*

I think that hope lives in different locations in each of us: some in the head, some in the heart — I suspect mine is in the gut, because this work is done best in the presence of companions, those we break bread with.

Sitting with friends here breaking bacon (usually spiked with some extra hot chilli to see my reaction) and sharing the sunshine that breaks through after these freezing cold evenings, I see the pains of this world as our visitors encounter them.

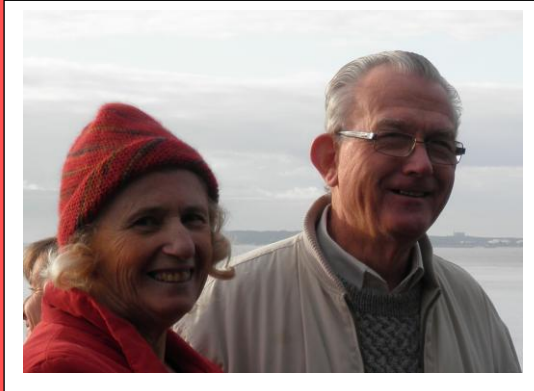
Over a roll we split in two, a friend recently shared with me her fears, a terminal diagnosis. Her fear isn't the diagnosis itself, it's that she isn't telling anyone because she wants to be able to focus on caring for others, and not to become "the story". "Besides, I brought this on myself, but look at her over there..." she waved a hand in a direction to indicate who she was speaking about. "Poor B%^h has done nothing wrong, and look at what's happened to her! That's who I want to help with what I've got left."

If there ever was a poem written for Wayside, I think it would begin, 'when despair grows, we go and break bread in the presence of wild women...' Berry's poem might be all about the peace of still waters, but Wayside's raging river is my reminder that hope is always alive, and love always triumphs over hate.
