Scriptures

Proverbs 8:1-4, 22-31

The writer of Proverbs introduces us to creativity, joy, and supportive relationships in the person of Wisdom. This feminine figure reminds us of the Spirit of God active in creation, and of Christ the Word.

Psalm 8 also invites us to reflect on the wonders of creation, earthly and heavenly. The sense of awe moves us to consider our role as humans in this amazing world. Recognising that we are neither divine nor animals, the writer asks how we even find a place in the Divine consciousness.

Romans 5:1–5 reminds us that even though our experience of living in the world may include suffering along with wonder, our relationship with God is one of peace. This peace is an undeserved gift of God that offers us hope for the future.

John 16:12-15

Jesus has a close relationship with God and the Spirit, a relationship beyond the experience and comprehension of his close friends and followers. He promises that in time, for them and for us, the Spirit will bring a fuller grasp of what is true and a deeper understanding of who God is.

Theme Focus

On this Trinity Sunday, we are invited to step beyond definitions and enter a place of discovery where we may encounter the Divine in our experiences of wisdom, truth, and love.

Word for the Day

Today is known as Trinity Sunday when the church has traditionally focussed on God as 'Three-in-One'. For the Jewish faith, 'God is One God' has always been a basic tenet of belief. As part of their daily prayers, Jews recite the Shema which affirms the oneness of God. After Jesus' death and resurrection, his followers increasingly recognised God in Jesus' life, ministry, and teaching. Through the activity of the Holy Spirit in their lives, they also came to acknowledge the reality of God present among them. How could they affirm the presence of God in each of these experiences of the divine?

The early church tried to explain God in terms of Greek philosophy of the day and referred to the Persons of the Godhead: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Since the rise of feminist theology, the exclusively masculine imagery of God has been challenged; God is also described as Creator/Earth-maker, Pain-Bearer/Redeemer, and Life-Giver/Comforter/Sustainer. Which of these do we use most often? Which are helpful? Which other names might we use to describe these aspects of God's being?

This week's readings from Proverbs and John are among the few in scripture which mention all three persons of the Trinity within a single verse or two. Both refer not only to the activity of the Godhead in different ways, but also to the close, loving, and supportive relationship between them. Daniel Migliore refers to God as 'other-affirming, self-giving, community building God of love' (Daniel L. Migliore. *Faith Seeking Understanding.* Eerdmans, 1993).

How can we move from trying to define—and thus limit—the different persons of the Triune God to expanding our understanding, so that we embrace and participate in God's varied and far-reaching activity in the world? Early Christian theologians used the concept of a dance—a divine dance, *perichoresis*—to describe how the persons of God indwell and make room for one another. How does this change our understanding of the nature of God?

Ideas for Reflection

- How can the different relationships for a person be helpful in understanding God?
- Explore the images for God: water experienced as ice, liquid, vapour; a person in relationship as mother wife daughter the same person experienced differently.

- How important is it for you to affirm the Christian belief in the trinitarian nature of God? Why?
- How would you describe God to someone who comes from a background with no understanding of the divine?
- Think of the characteristics and qualities you believe that God has and the names you use to address or refer to God. Which are most important to you now?
