## **Scriptures**

#### Hosea 1:2-10

The prophet Hosea is ordered to take Gomer for a wife, and their three children are given metaphorical names that reflect the desolation of Israel and its abandonment by Yahweh. It is unclear whether this marriage was a historical event or merely an analogy for the relationship between Israel and Yahweh.

#### Psalm 85

The exile provoked a range of questions and responses from the Israelites, which can be seen in this psalm. The psalmist seems to thank God for rescuing Israel but then asks when God will stop being angry at them. The last section returns to the perennial themes of righteousness, truth, peace and loving-kindness as paths to salvation.

## Colossians 2:6-15, (16-19)

The writer of the letter to Colossians warns the people that human philosophies and understandings are futile. Rather, they are encouraged to establish themselves in faith in Jesus, remembering their baptism and his death on the cross.

#### Luke 11:1-13

This passage includes Jesus teaching the disciples to pray, a parable about hospitality, and a metaphor about God and parenting. All three parts encourage us to ask God for what we need.

## **Theme Focus**

In times of uncertainty, the psalmist reminds us that questioning and praise can go hand in hand, while Jesus calls us to step beyond passive waiting to ask and receive with a faith that trusts in God's response in love, righteousness, and peace.

## Word for the Day

While we often think of David when we think of the Psalms, the superscription attributes this psalm to the Korahites. The story of Korah's rebellion is found in Numbers 16, where the earth swallows him whole as punishment for his sins. However, his lineage is redeemed, and his descendants are mentioned in 1 Chron 6:31–38, 9:19–21, and 12:1–6 as loyal subjects of Israel. Psalms 42, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 84, 85, 87, and 88 are all attributed to the Korahites and contain arguably some of the most beautiful poetry in the Bible.

The early verses of Psalm 85 reflect an understanding of God's anger, which perhaps contains a memory of Korah. That is not the end of the story, though. Israel and all its people are redeemed and are blessed with faithful love, truth, righteousness, and peace.

#### Ideas for Reflection

- How does a memory of our ancestors inform who we are? This might be those who were our biological lineage or maybe the ancestors of the church or of our faith. How might we honour their memory?
- The psalmist attributes Israel's difficulties to God's anger. How does this
  theology feel to us? Is there another way of finding the reason for life's
  challenges? What happens if difficult things happen in our life for no
  reason? How, then, might we respond?
- How might we understand the idea that 'righteousness walks before God, making a road for God's steps'? What might this look like today in our country? What does righteousness look like for us today?
   What does it look like for righteousness and peace to 'kiss' in the world today?
- How might our persistent prayers and actions lead to a more peaceful, righteous society?
- If we were to write a poem about life's challenges, what might it show about our understanding of God?

In the Psalms, "Selah" likely signifies a pause or rest, possibly for musical interlude or reflection, though its precise meaning remains debated among scholars. Some interpretations suggest it could also mean "praise" or "lift up," particularly in passages related to worship. It's generally understood as a direction for either the reader or the musicians, prompting a moment of contemplation or a change in musical direction.
