Scriptures

Hosea 11:1-11

In this passage, the names Israel and Ephraim are used interchangeably in a lament for the fallen Northern Kingdom. The prophet promises that when Israel/Ephraim listen, Yahweh will be merciful.

Psalm 107:1-9, 43

Redemption is a key theme in these verses, which is offered to God's people because of God's 'hesed' (loving-kindness). Those who have been redeemed will give thanks, and those who are wise will carefully consider God's *hesed*.

Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

The congregation at Colossae is encouraged to reject the parts of their human nature that encourage greed, anger and immorality. Instead, they are to look to Christ—through him, all earthly differences may be put aside.

Luke 12:13-21

Using the framework of inheritance, Jesus teaches against prioritising wealth because it cannot be taken with us when we die. Instead, he enjoins the crowd to be 'rich toward God.'

Theme Focus

As we listen to the psalmist's song of thanksgiving and hear Jesus' parable about generosity, we are invited to reflect on how God's enduring faithfulness calls us to live with gratitude, trusting that no matter our circumstances, we can step beyond fear and share God's goodness with others.

Word for the Day

The writer of Psalm 107:1–9, 43 reminds us that God is good, and the right response to goodness is to give thanks. In this reading, we have only one example of redemption—those who have wandered into the desert. But if we read the full psalm there is example after example of the ways that 'some of the redeemed' had wandered away. It is human nature to wander away from God's goodness. The psalm contains the repeated refrain, 'They cried out to the Lord in their distress, and God saved them from their desperate circumstances.' How many times have we cried out to God and been saved from our desperation? What stops us from crying out? What helps us to remember to cry out?

Ideas for Reflection

- When have we wandered away? What does that look like in a contemporary context? Have we cared when others have wandered away? Have we heard their cries of distress? How do we respond when we do notice signs of distress in ourselves or in others?
- How do we tell our stories of God's faithfulness? Who do we tell these stories to? What is the response we get when we tell these stories?
- The last verse notes that 'whoever is wise will pay attention.' Is this how
 we measure wisdom? How do we pay attention when it seems like the
 whole world is crying out? How do we choose who to listen to and to care
 for when we have limited resources?
- Thinking about the two readings together, do we remember to give thanks for all we have? Are we greedy and always asking God for more than we need? Are we jealous of what others have instead of being thankful for what we have been given?
- How can we cultivate a habit or practice of giving thanks in a world that often encourages us to always want more?
- The parable warns against hoarding wealth instead of using it for good, while Psalm 107 calls us to remember and respond to God's goodness. How do we ensure that our gratitude is connected to generosity?
