Scriptures

Isaiah 1:1, 10-20

The prophet issues a warning that if Israel does not turn away from their sins, they will be 'devoured.' The passage contains a serious warning that worship and religious observance must be matched with a concern for the marginalised.

Psalm 50:1-8, 22-23

The psalmist reminds the hearer that God is sovereign and judges over all the earth. In response, we can honour God through thanksgiving, sacrifice and right living.

Hebrews 11:29—12:2

This famous chapter outlines a history of Israel's faithful people, including Abraham, Jacob, and Sarah. Faithfulness for each of them looks different and expands well beyond their individual lives.

Luke 12:32-40

The home is used as a context for describing the coming of God. The reader is encouraged to keep watch in order to be ready for God's coming because the set time is unknown.

Theme Focus

As we hear Isaiah's call to advocate for the vulnerable and are inspired by the stories of our ancestors in faith, we are invited to reflect on what it means to step beyond passive belief into a faith that moves us toward justice, inclusion, and hope.

Word for the Day

The words of the prophets are often contained in oracles or speeches, which can seem entirely foreign to our ears and to our contexts. Yet, when we look below the surface, we can see some of the same themes and issues that we continue to wrestle with today. There is performative worship and ritual action that ignores issues of vulnerability and injustice. There are legal claims here where the rich are able to buy justice while the poor are bankrupted by legal action. There is the requirement to look after our neighbours, particularly those who are marginalised and oppressed.

Ideas for Reflection


- It is important that we do not read this passage as denouncing worship and its associated rituals. There is nothing inherently wrong with these things, however they must be performed with the right intentions. This begs the questions: What are the right intentions? How do we embody them when we come to worship?
- Sodom and Gomorrah have historically been linked with aberrant sexual
 activity, but scholars often point to it being an indictment about the lack of
 hospitality. Here, the reference is probably warning that if justice is not
 enacted then the towns risk being destroyed entirely like Sodom and
 Gomorrah were.
- The oppressed, the orphan and the widow are often referred to in biblical poetry as a shorthand for those in the community who were especially vulnerable. Who is vulnerable in our community? How might the treatment of women, Indigenous people, LGBTIQA+ people, migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, and people subject to racism inform our reading of this passage? How should we respond that goes beyond the worship service?
- How do we read this passage in the light of Hebrews 11:1–3, 8–16?
- What do the two passages together point us to?
- What does faith look like in the perspective of worship and justicemaking?
