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The Service of the Word

BIBLE READINGS

Job 39:1-8, 26-30

1 "Do you know when the mountain goats give birth? Do you observe the calving of the deer? 2 Can you number the months that they fulfill, and do you know the time when they give birth, 3 when they crouch to give birth to their offspring and are delivered of their young? 4 Their young ones become strong; they grow up in the open; they go forth and do not return to them. 5 "Who has let the wild ass go free? Who has loosed the bonds of the swift ass, 6 to which I have given the steppe for its home, the salt land for its dwelling place? 7 It scorns the tumult of the city; it does not hear the shouts of the driver. 8 It ranges the mountains as its pasture, and it searches after every green thing.

26 "Is it by your wisdom that the hawk soars and spreads its wings toward the south? 27 Is it at your command that the eagle mounts up and makes its nest on high? 28 It lives on the rock and makes its home in the fastness of the rocky crag. 29 From there it spies the prey; its eyes see it from far away. 30 Its young ones suck up blood, and where the slain are, there it is."

Psalm 104:14-23

14 You cause the grass to grow for the cattle and plants for people to cultivate, to bring forth food from the earth 15 and wine to gladden the human heart, oil to make the face shine and bread to strengthen the human heart. 16 The trees of the field are watered abundantly, the cedars of Lebanon that he planted. 17 In them the birds build their nests; the stork has its home in the fir trees. 18 The high mountains are for the wild goats; the rocks are a refuge for the coneys. 19 You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting. 20 You make darkness, and it is night, when all the animals of the forest come creeping out. 21 The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God. 22 When the sun rises, they withdraw and lie down in their dens. 23 People go out to their work and to their labor until the evening.

Luke 12:22-31

22 He said to his disciples, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. 23 For life is more than food and the body more than clothing. 24 Consider the ravens: they neither sow nor reap, they have neither storehouse nor barn, and yet God feeds them. Of how much more value are you than the birds! 25 And which of you by worrying can add a single hour to your span of life? 26 If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest? 27 Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. 28 But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more will he clothe you, you of little faith! 29 And do not keep seeking what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. 30 For it is the nations of the world that seek all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. 31 Instead, seek his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.

REFLECTION

We're continuing our journey through the Season of Creation. Last Sunday was Ocean Sunday, where we remembered God's presence in the seas. Today is Flora and Fauna Sunday, where we turn our eyes to the plants and animals of the earth — the forests, the flowers, the birds, and the creatures all around us. That means today we're invited to look more closely at the plants and animals of our world, not just as decorations or background, but as something deeply important to God — and to us.

Jesus once said, "Look at the birds. Look at the flowers. They don't worry like humans do, but God takes care of them." Now, maybe you've heard that before. But have you ever really thought about it? What if birds and flowers are not just pretty things to look at... but are actually teachers? What if nature is speaking — quietly, constantly — and we've just been too busy, too anxious, or too distracted to listen? If we pay attention, our Bible readings today — from Luke, Job, and Psalm 104 — open up a new kind of conversation. They ask us: What do we think really matters in life? What kind of knowledge do we chase after? What kind of value do we give to life that isn't human? In these passages, plants and animals are not just background scenery. They're not just resources for us to use. They're not just tools for our comfort or food for our tables. They are part of God's world, and they are doing God's work in their own way.

In Psalm 104, we hear how: Grass grows for the cattle. Trees give homes to the birds. Mountains become shelter for wild goats. Water flows to nourish the land. And even wine brings joy to human hearts. Everything is connected. Each part of creation blesses another. And all are cared for by a generous, loving God. But let me ask you something: Do we see nature like this? Or do we only see trees as wood, animals as meat, and land as something to mine, sell, or build on? Let me tell you a story. A few years ago, I walked through part of the Australian bush after a wildfire. Everything was black. The ground was covered in ash. When I walked, dust came up around my feet. The trees were burned. Their branches were bare and broken. Some trees were standing, but just barely. The forest was quiet — no birds, no wind, no sound. And the smell... The air still smelled like smoke and something heavy. It didn't just look like death. It felt like it. It felt like the forest was gone. But then... I saw something small. A little green leaf, pushing up through the ashes. Bright green — soft, full of life. Just one at first. Then another. And another. A few steps later, I saw small green leaves starting to grow on the branches of a tree. Down by the path, small flowers were blooming — yellow, purple, and pink. And then, in the trees above me... I heard it. A bird. Life was coming back. Not because people helped it. Not because we fixed it. But because God made life strong. Because God made everything connected. Because God gives hope — even after fire. Maybe you've had a time like that. When life felt dark. When something precious was lost. When you felt tired, broken, or afraid that nothing good could grow again. And maybe... as a church, we're going through a time like that now. A season that feels heavy. Where the numbers are down, the budget is tight, the work is a lot, and the energy feels stretched thin. So many needs — and not always enough people or time to meet them. And if we're honest, sometimes we wonder what the future will look like... or if we'll make it through. But friends — just like that forest, I believe new life is already beginning to grow. Maybe we can't see it clearly yet. Maybe it's still small — a quiet prayer, a new person showing up, a moment of unexpected joy. But God is still working. God is still planting hope. And God is not done with us. We are not the ones who hold it all

together. God is. And even when we feel like we've reached the end, God is already preparing a new beginning. Because that's who God is — the One who brings life out of ashes.

And just like we believe God is not finished with us... we must also remember: God is not finished with the rest of creation either. The forests, the oceans, the animals they too are part of God's story. And they, too, are crying out for healing. But here's the thing, friends: Nature is strong — yes — but not unbreakable. Koalas, one of Australia's most loved animals, are now endangered in many places. Why? Because their forests — their homes — are being cleared. The Great Barrier Reef, home to thousands of fish and sea creatures, is dying. Why? Because the oceans are warming too fast, and the coral is bleaching. These are not just environmental problems. These are spiritual questions. Do we believe that God loves these creatures too? Do we care for what God calls "good"? In the book of Job, when Job asks God for answers, God doesn't respond with explanations. God responds with questions: "Do you know when the mountain goats give birth?" "Do you know where the wild donkeys live?" "Do you know how the eagle finds its nest?" And of course — the answer is no. We don't know. We're not in control. But God knows. God sees. God cares. In Hebrew, the word for "know" — yada — isn't just about facts. It means deep, personal knowing. It means being connected. Paying attention. Understanding with the heart. God is asking us — gently but clearly: "Do you know My creation? Not just its price — but its value?"

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus says: "Do not worry. Your Father knows what you need." It sounds simple. But we know it's not. We worry all the time — About money, jobs, health, family, the planet, the future. Sometimes it feels like too much. But Jesus says: "Stop. Look at the birds. Look at the flowers." "They are not anxious. They trust the One who made them." This is not just about peace. It's about wisdom. When we stop and really look at nature, we start to see God's hand again — not just in church, but in every tree, every bird, every cloud in the sky. And then, we begin to ask new questions: How can we live in a way that helps life to grow? What would it look like to bless the Earth instead of just using it? What habits do I need to change? What voices — animal, human, or otherwise — are being silenced in my community?

So, friends, here is your invitation for this week: Look around your neighbourhood. Your street. Your garden. Your church. Your school. What kinds of life are in danger? What part of creation is crying out for help? What relationships — with nature or with people — are breaking? And then ask: "What can I do to bring healing?" Not everything. But something. Because when we act in love toward creation, we are not just "going green" — we are walking with God. Let me close with this: Every flower that blooms, every bird that sings, every tree that grows tall — they are doing exactly what God created them to do. They're not waiting for permission. They are simply living, praising, giving, receiving. And they are inviting us to join them. So let's

open our eyes. Let's open our hearts. Let's care — not just for ourselves — but for all of life. Because our God is not only the God of humans. He is the God of all creation. Amen.
