Scriptures from the Revised Common Lectionary

Daniel 7:1-3, 15-18

Daniel has a vision of four great beasts rising from the sea, symbolising four kings who will arise.

Psalm 149 is a call for the faithful to praise God and sing a new song. It emphasises a mutual relationship, as God delights in God's people.

Ephesians 1:11–23 uses the language of inheritance to describe our relationship with Christ. The writer prays that believers may receive the Spirit of revelation and wisdom to know God more fully.

Luke 6:20-31

Jesus, speaking to his disciples, presents a series of blessings and woes. He continues to those who were listening, urging them to love their enemies and to treat others as they would want to be treated.

Theme Focus

On All Saints' Day, we remember those who have gone before us and inspired our faith, and we honour their lives and legacy by living out the values they passed on.

Word for the Day

There are two aspects of the reading from Ephesians that relate directly to the commemoration of All Saints' Day. The first is Paul's use of the word 'inheritance'.

The use of this term could raise questions about God choosing specific people who are special. We need to remember that the term is being used by a person from their Jewish heritage. Being chosen brought both responsibility and comfort. Being an heir of God meant being an instrument of God's purpose in their own context. The other term used here is 'saints'. Saints can be viewed as special people who have done something extraordinary in order for them to receive this title. Here, Paul uses the term more generally to describe those who are in Christ. There is an invitation to all of us in this passage to join the saints who have gone before us and who are still surrounding us.

Ideas for Reflection

- Who are the significant people in your life who have shaped your faith?
- How would you like to express your gratitude to these people?
- How might you be a 'saint' for others in your community?
- What gifts do you bring to the wider communion of saints?

Introduction to Theme

Have you read the writing of someone from the past that has had a profound impact on your faith life? Is there a hymn written in centuries past that stirs your emotions and has deep meaning? Is there someone who has died who still feels present to you in some way, although no longer physically present? If you answered 'yes' to any of these questions, you will have some sense of the communion of saints. All Saints' Day has been celebrated in a variety of different forms for thousands of years. Western Culture has shied away from remembering the dead, but there is something profound and meaningful about recalling people and their stories who have made an impact on the faith

lives of others. Today, we will remember those important people and include them within the wider communion of saints.

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As evening falls on All Saints Day, the glow of thousands of candles spreads through Kraków, Poland's New Podgórze Cemetery. Families leave candles on the hillside graves to continue a respectful holiday tradition and create a poignant memorial.

We will all have people we call to mind today. For me it is always my grandparents.

My beloved grandmother Marjorie, who drew on a bottomless well of faith and hope through the grief of her life and was sustained by a deep and residing peace and joy. As a gifted composer she put fresh words of faith to music well into her 80s and her songs are still loved and sung at Uniting churches in Victoria.

My beloved grandparents Howard and Valda, officers in the Salvation Army, whose devotion to Jesus was fierce and whose words about him were simple yet fiery with conviction and love.

These are the ordinary saints of God. We have known them, loved them. Some have passed beyond memory but are a treasure forever held in the life of God. They surround us now, a holy communion alive in Christ, cheering us from ahead, shaping us still, inspiring our lives.

On 1 November I will count them all among the saints and speak their names out loud. I will light a candle for them, not only in memory, but as a symbol of the life that has swallowed up death and the love that will outlive us all.

I will remember that we are they; that we by the grace of God take our place in the unbroken circle of the living and the dead, only human yet made holy in belonging.

I will claim the words of faith and promise that in Christ we commune still, bound by threads that can never break nor be cut. In life, in death, in life beyond death, we belong to God.

One of my favourite hymns is that classic, For all the saints, who from their labours rest, which I love to sing each year. If you're looking to listen, here is a lovely version. I also recently discovered new words for this old song which fill my heart to the brim. May they bless you too!

Soon dawns the promised day of Christ our Lord when all creation rises up restored, and all our song, from heart and soul outpoured: Alleluia, alleluia!

From every age, from dawn to setting sun, home come the saints to God the Three-in-One, bringing eternal praise on earth begun, Alleluia, alleluia!
