Scriptures from the Revised Common Lectionary Isaiah 65:17–25

God promises the creation of new heavens and a new earth where peace will reign, and God will hear prayers before they are spoken.

Isaiah 12

The prophecy of Isaiah predicts that when the Davidic rule is in place, the people will praise God. A song of praise and trust in God is presented as an example.

2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Paul addresses a situation in Thessalonica where some people are becoming idle and not working to earn a living for the food they eat. The community is urged to follow the example set by Paul and never tire of doing good.

Luke 21:5-19

As the disciples comment on the beauty of the temple, Jesus predicts its destruction. When asked when this will happen and what signs will precede it, he offers an apocalyptic vision marked by turmoil and persecution. Yet even in the midst of this bleak outlook, Jesus offers assurance and calls his followers to remain faithful.

Theme Focus

In a world where devastation abounds, we hold Isaiah's vision of a renewed earth and are called to live it into being with courage and hope, not fear, trusting in the new thing God is already doing among us.

Word for the Day

Luke 21:5–19 presents a conversation between Jesus and a group of people in the temple. It seems that some of the concerns are similar to the worries of the world today. When will war break out? How will it affect me and my family? When will the world end—due to spiritual beliefs or climate change?

As we hear the news of the world around us—wars, natural disasters, corrupt leadership, people living in poverty—it is natural to react with fear. However, Jesus replies to the people, saying, 'Do not be terrified'. Jesus does not ask them to put their head in the sand and pretend everything is wonderful. Instead, he encourages them to put their trust and their hope in God and stay grounded. This does not mean that life will be easy, but with their lives in God they will endure.

Ideas for Reflection

- When you look at the world around you, what events or situations bring you most despair?
- Where do you see people acting out of fear? What are the results of this?
- What might it look like for you to put your hope in God?
- How can we hold the needs of our world and our community without getting caught up in fear and despair?

November 16, Proper 28

Readings: Isaiah 65:17-25 and Isaiah 12, Malachi 4:1-2a and Psalm 98, 2
Thessalonians 3:6-13, Luke 21:5-19

When I read the calamitous future described in Luke 21 I can't help but feeling that this is not a snapshot of some special moment in time but rather a broad and sobering telling of human history in its totality. Has there ever been a time when there were *no* wars or insurrections? When did kingdoms *not* rise against kingdoms? When have there *not* been famines and plagues?

It can be easy for Christians to slip into the trap of reading Jesus' apocalyptic words in Luke 21 (and elsewhere) from a human and historical perspective. In order somehow to understand and predict (and perhaps avoid) what is to come. It is perfectly reasonable to want to avert calamity, or at least avoid persecution. Yet the key message for believers in this part of the gospel is not about avoiding, but about enduring; about resting in the words of wisdom and trusting in God in the face of hatred and betrayal. Even though the first hearers of Jesus may well have thought that the end of all things was months or at most a few years away, as history continued on the Gospel has helped people of faith to endure. In a time when many of us feel that we have little control over our own future, perhaps resting again in the wisdom of God will help us endure in the days and years to come.


