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**BIBLE READINGS** Isaiah 63:7–9, Matthew 2:13–23

**Isaiah 63:7–9**

7 I will recount the gracious deeds of the Lord, the praiseworthy acts of the Lord, because of all that the Lord has done for us and the great favor to the house of Israel that he has shown them according to his mercy, according to the abundance of his steadfast love. 8 For he said, “Surely they are my people, children who will not act deceitfully,” and he became their savior 9 in all their distress. It was no messenger or angel but his presence that saved them; in his love and pity it was he who redeemed them; he lifted them up and carried them all the days of old.

### **Matthew 2:13–23**

13 Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, “Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you, for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.” 14 Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt 15 and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, “Out of Egypt I have called my son.” 16 When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the magi, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the magi. 17 Then what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah was fulfilled: 18 “A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more.” 19 When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, 20 “Get up, take the child and his mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the child’s life are dead.” 21 Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother, and went to the land of Israel. 22 But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. 23 There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, “He will be called a Nazarene.”

### **REFLECTION**

Before we do anything else, let me ask you a simple question. How was your Christmas? Some of you probably had a wonderful time. Family gatherings, good food, laughter, maybe even a bit too much food. Some of you travelled. Some of you rested. And some of you might be thinking, “Well... Christmas was nice, but also a bit tiring.” That’s usually how it goes, isn’t it? Christmas is joyful, but it’s also busy. Beautiful, but sometimes exhausting. And now, here we are—the first Sunday after Christmas. Life is slowly returning to normal. As you all know, today is the last Sunday of 2025—a moment when we look back on the year that has passed. Some of you may say it was a good year. Some may say it was hard. Some of you might feel a mixture of both. This year, some of us have experienced joy—family gatherings, celebrations, moments of laughter. Some of us have faced challenges—illness, stress, or personal losses. This year also reminded us that the world we live in is not always safe or secure. When we look

at the news throughout the year, we see it again and again. We have witnessed violent conflict continue in places like Ukraine, where fighting and destruction have persisted and affected countless lives. We have seen deep and ongoing struggles in the Middle East, including intense clashes between nations and armed groups. We have seen long-standing civil conflict in Sudan continue to disrupt families and communities. And in Southeast Asia, border clashes between Thailand and Cambodia forced hundreds of thousands of people from their homes this year. These are only a few examples—not even the whole list of places where people have faced fear, displacement, and loss. When we add to this the tragedy of local violence, including shootings like the one we saw at Bondi Beach, the reality becomes clear: 2025 was a year marked by a world still deeply affected by violence, insecurity, and human suffering.

And as we reflect on those realities, we come to our reading today from Matthew, which may feel surprisingly relevant. We often think of the Christmas story as warm and peaceful—angels singing, shepherds kneeling, a stable filled with quiet awe. But in Matthew 2, we see something very different. An angel appears to Joseph and says, “Get up. Take the child and his mother, and flee.” Jesus, still a baby, is already in danger. Herod, threatened by this newborn king, orders the deaths of all boys under the age of two. Take a moment to really think about those children—innocent lives cut short. Imagine their families, their parents, their relatives—what shock, grief, and fear they must have felt. Try to feel even a little of that weight, and let it remind us of the vulnerability that exists in our world, both then and now. This story is unsettling. It is frightening. It reflects a world where powerful people act out of fear, and innocent lives are put at risk. And it feels all too familiar to us, doesn’t it? We have seen headlines about war and displacement. We have seen families forced to leave their homes. We have seen violence claimed in the name of security. In many ways, this ancient story feels like today’s news. The names have changed, but the reality—fear, power, and the suffering of the innocent—remains.

So where is God in all of this? Here is the heart of the gospel: God does not stay distant. God comes near. God enters the very danger and uncertainty we know all too well. In Jesus, God chooses not to watch from afar, but to enter our world—not in power and dominance, but as a vulnerable child. Joseph and Mary don’t solve every problem. They don’t make everything safe. But they do what they can. They protect life. They respond with care. And that is significant. Let me share a simple story from my own experience. A few months ago, while I was getting ready to attend a table tennis gathering after Sunday service, a homeless couple approached me. At first glance, it was clear that life had been very hard for them. I asked them, “How can I help you?” They didn’t ask for money. They just wanted someone to listen, and to pray for them. So I guided them to a quiet place, and we spent some time together. They shared their struggles, their fears, and their tears. I had nothing material to offer, but I could listen, we could mourn together, and we could even share moments of hope. And we prayed together. They thanked me, saying, “Thank you for praying for us, and

thank you for listening to our story,” before they left. It was not heroic. It was not dramatic. But it mattered. And that is exactly what God shows us in Jesus. God enters the fragile, the fearful, the uncertain—and says, “I am with you.” Not from a distance, but up close. And just as I was able to be present with that couple, God calls each of us to be present in the world—especially where fear, uncertainty, and suffering exist. Have you ever heard of the “Free Hugs” movement? It started years ago with people holding signs in busy streets, offering a simple embrace to strangers. It’s amazing to see how a five-second hug can transform someone’s face from tension to peace. Psychologists tell us that a sincere hug lowers stress hormones and creates a sense of safety. It tells the heart, “You are not alone.” As I prepared for today, I imagined God giving each of you a “Holy Hug” for the year 2025. Think of the moments this year when you felt like giving up, or when life felt like a stormy sea. In those moments, even when you couldn’t see him, God’s invisible arms were wrapped around you. God’s presence was there—quiet, steadfast, and close.

So what does that mean for us, as we look back on 2025? We cannot stop every war. We cannot prevent every tragedy. We cannot make every child safe. But we can respond with care. We can notice vulnerability. We can pray. We can speak up for the powerless. We can comfort. We can walk alongside those who are hurting. Small acts of care matter—because they reflect the very way God chose to come into this world. And here is the hope: Jesus’ story does not end with danger and flight. Jesus grows. Jesus lives. And God’s work continues. What seems fragile does not stop God’s purpose. God is with us through uncertainty, through fear, through the complexities of life. As we leave this year behind and enter a new one, may we remember this truth: In a world filled with uncertainty, fear, and brokenness, God comes close—and calls us to walk with others in love. This is what it means to follow Jesus. This is what hope looks like. Even in a world filled with hardship, difficulty, and events we cannot understand, this is why we are called to live with hope—trusting that God is with us and guiding us every step of the way. Amen.
